SUBJECT: Undergraduate Research and Creative Opportunities

Dear Students:

We have hoped that more undergraduate students at Utah State University would take advantage of the tremendous resources our faculty have to offer outside the classroom through their on-going research and creative activities. We made this a challenge to the USU team that attended the Danforth Foundation Workshop during the summer of 1974, and they came back with a plan to encourage, enlarge, and systematize collaboration between faculty and undergraduates. It was the team's belief, which I share, that the first-hand experience of search and discovery for students engaged in serious projects with faculty would benefit both partners in the teaching-learning relationship.

It seems to me that Undergraduate Research and Creative Opportunities (URCO) at USU may provide a number of positive results. Among these are the following:

- 1. another mode of teaching and advising (like an apprenticeship or mentor relationship) that interested faculty and students can choose;
- more relevant and stimulating learning for some who feel participating in the real world is meaningful;
- additional assistance to faculty in developing their scholarly pursuits and professional interests;
- 4. the generating force for more research and creative effort;
- 5. the vehicle to uncover and develop new research and creative talent;
- 6. a means to increase industrial ties and attract additional funds from off campus; and
- 7. improved community relations.

An experiment with URCO by the Colleges of Agriculture and of Humanities, Arts and Social Sciences proved successful in the spring of 1975; and other colleges, principally Science, Engineering, and Natural Resources have done similar things in the past. We now attempt to launch URCO on a university-wide basis during 1975-76.

Please permit me to encourage your involvement in this worthwhile learning experience.
