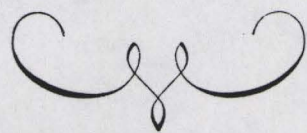
## *Senior Report*

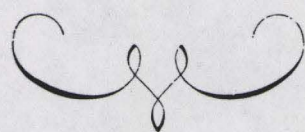

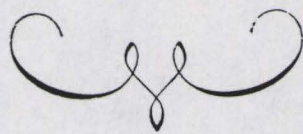

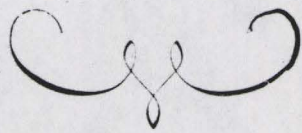
## *Sophomore Report*

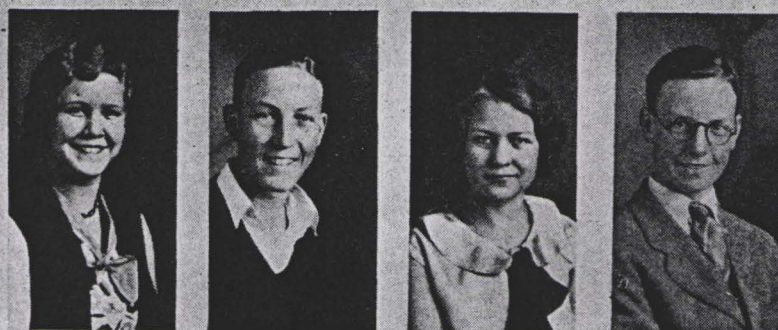

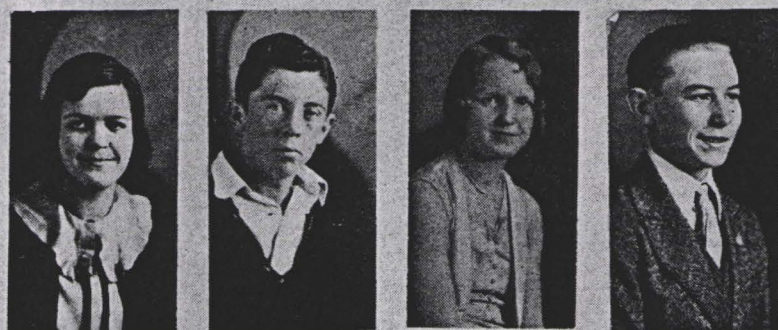

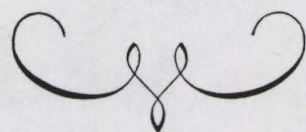

## *Freshmen Report*

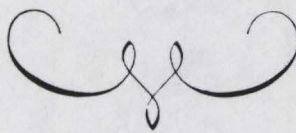
THE Sophomores seem to think they are superior to the Freshmen, although they have had only one more year of High School experience than we, yet they have been interested in our activities and affairs.

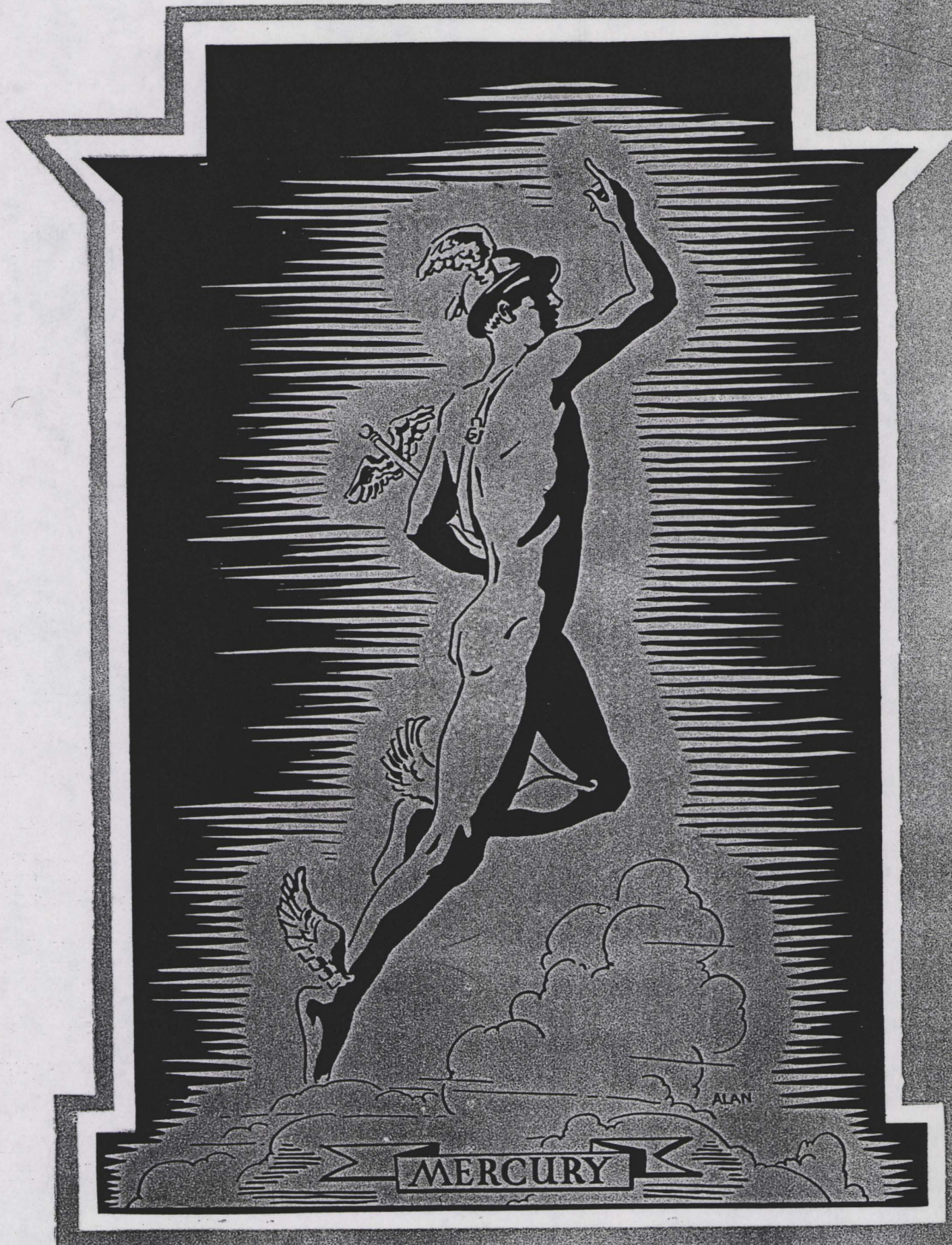

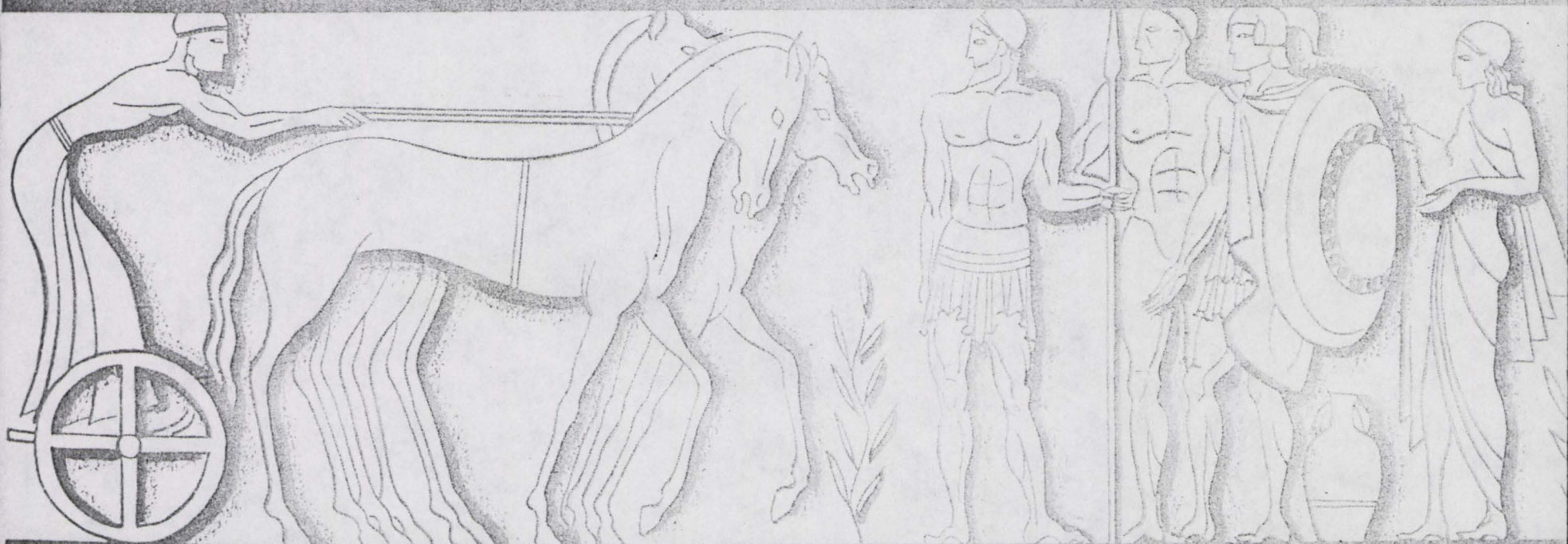

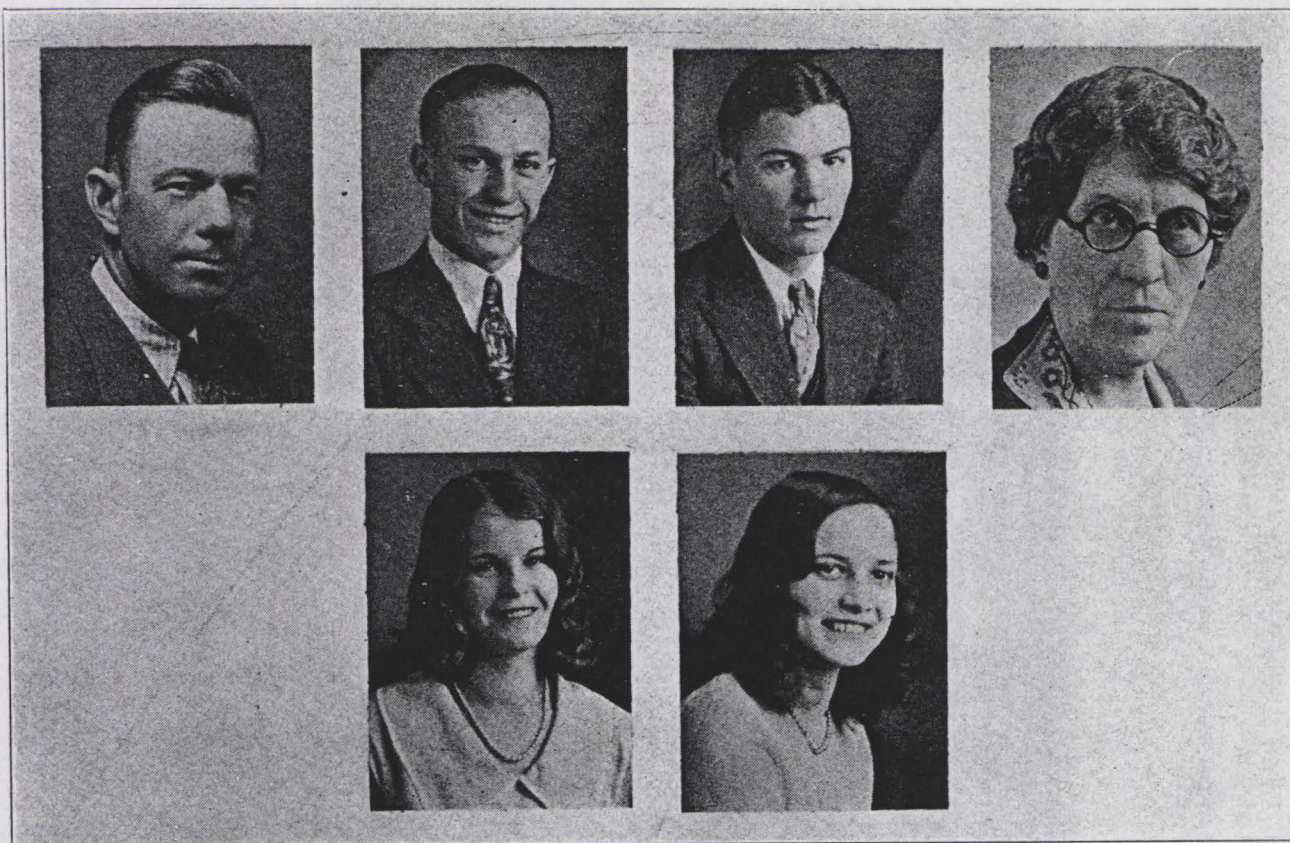
## *Dormitory*

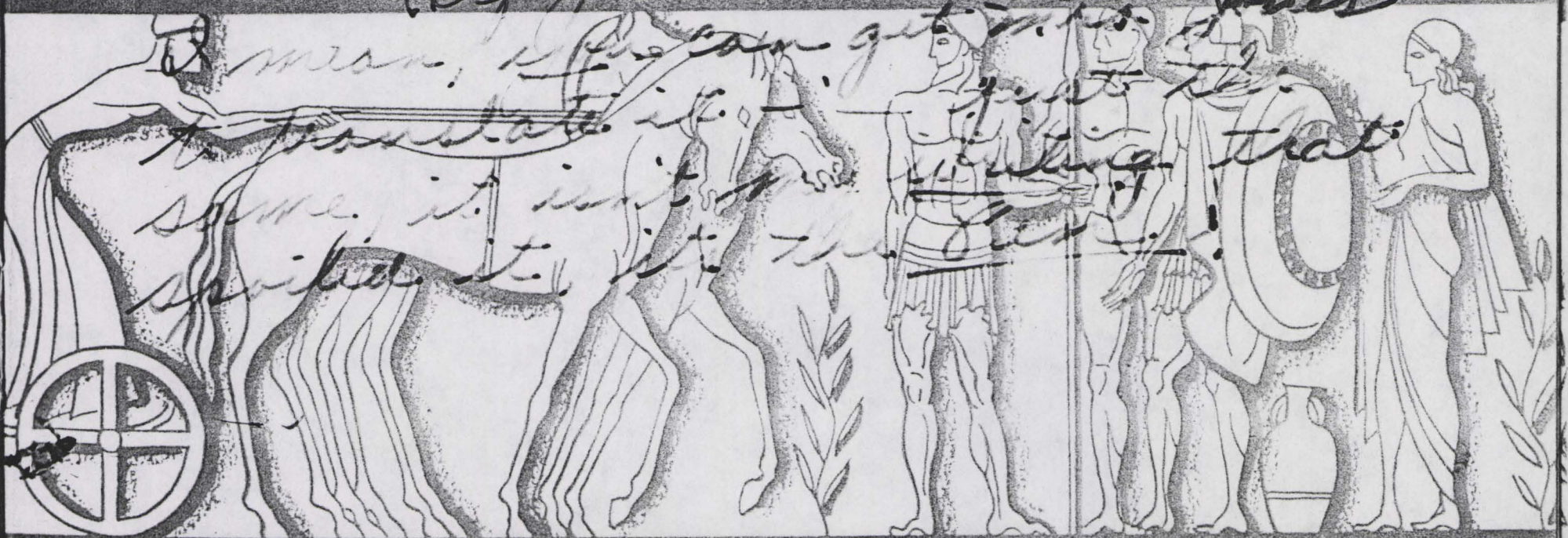

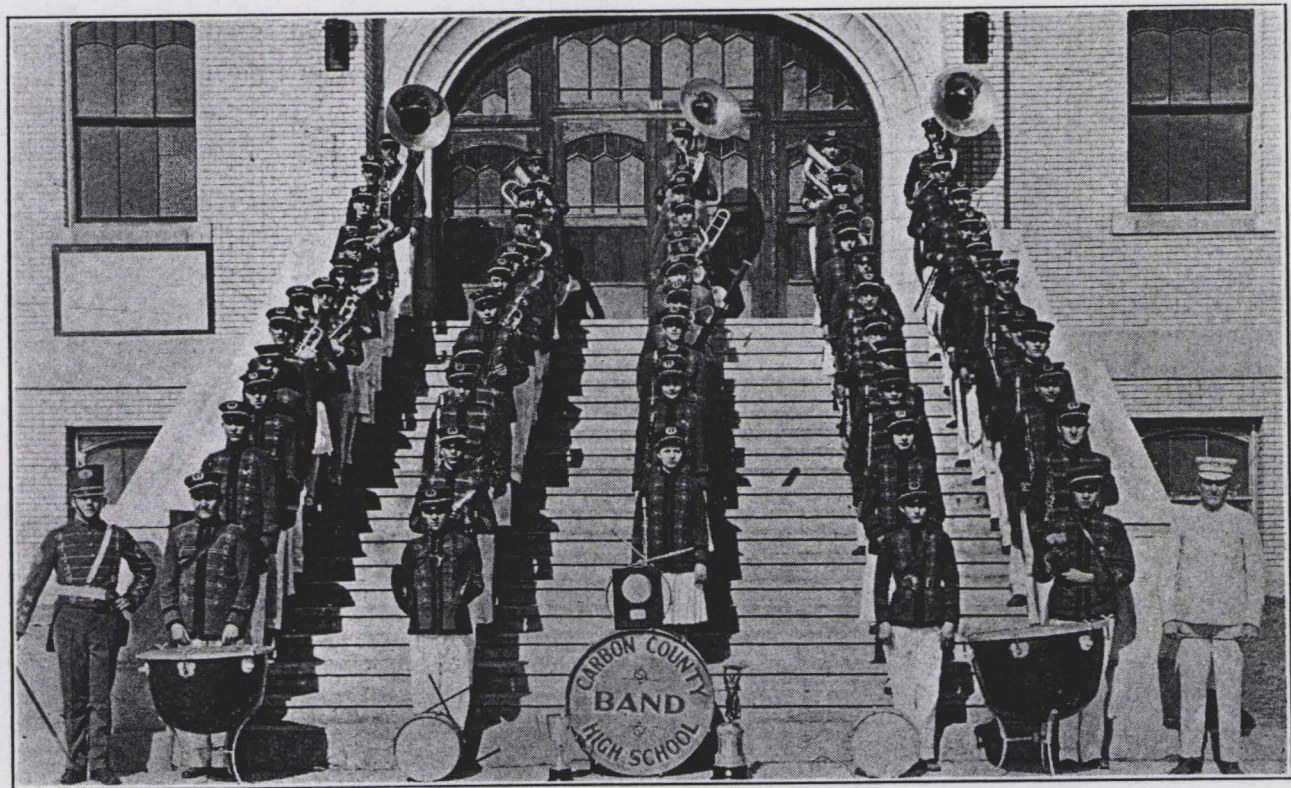

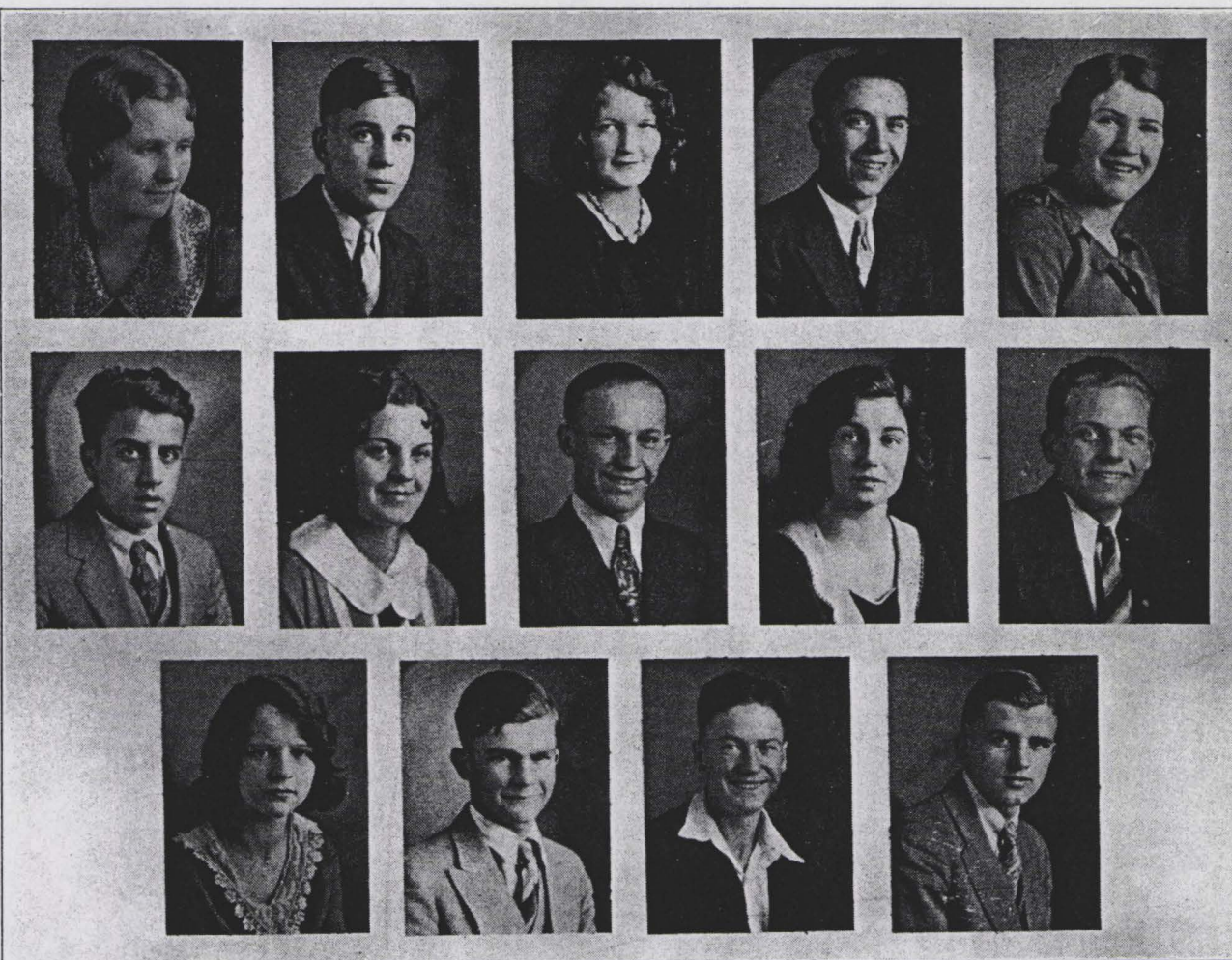

### "JONSEY"

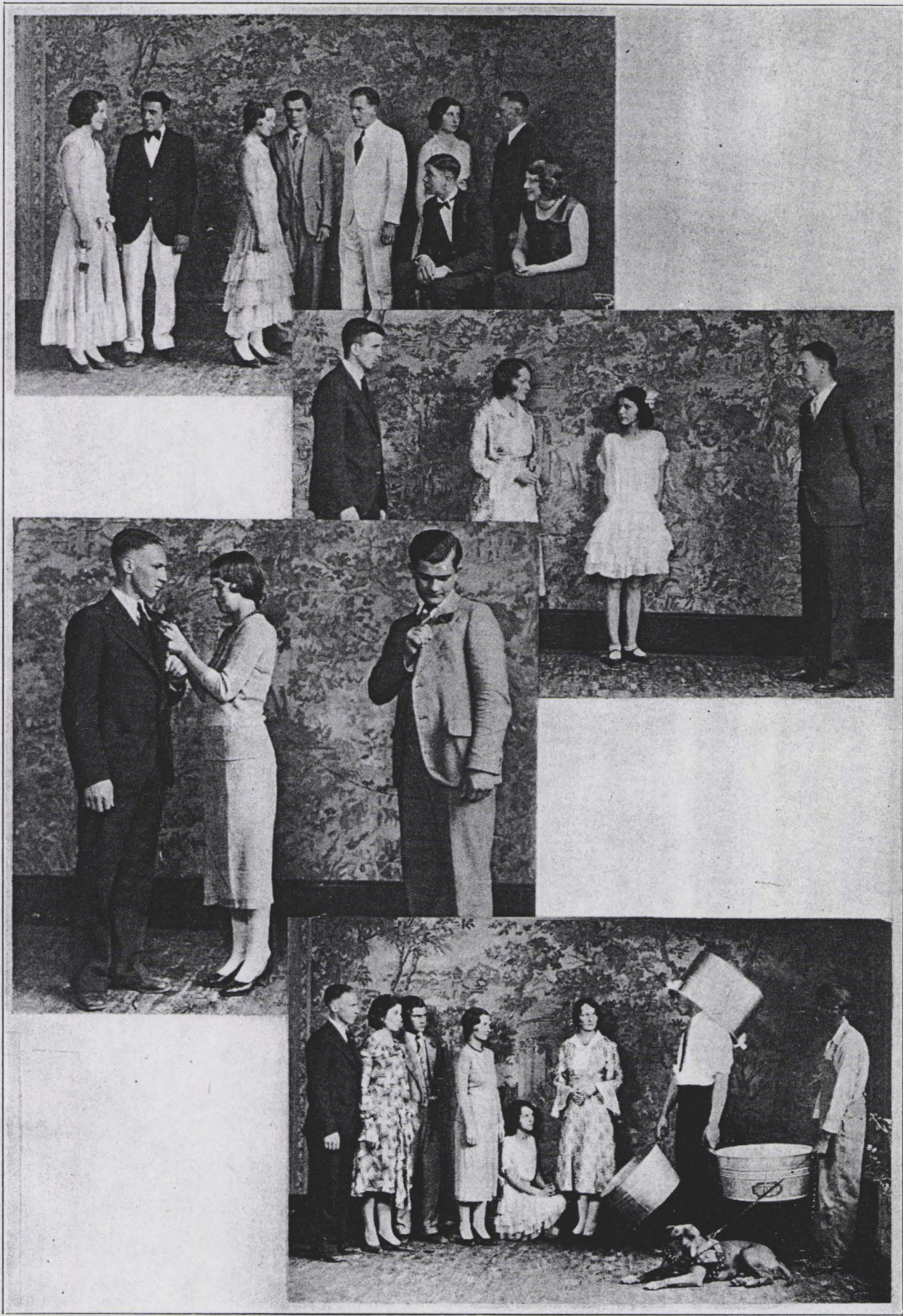

## Debating

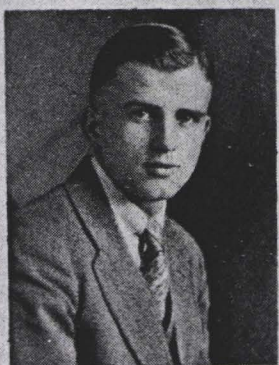

The Senior Hop Committee was comprised of Tony Sarricino, Phyllis Snow, Annie Rauhala, and Loa Davidson.

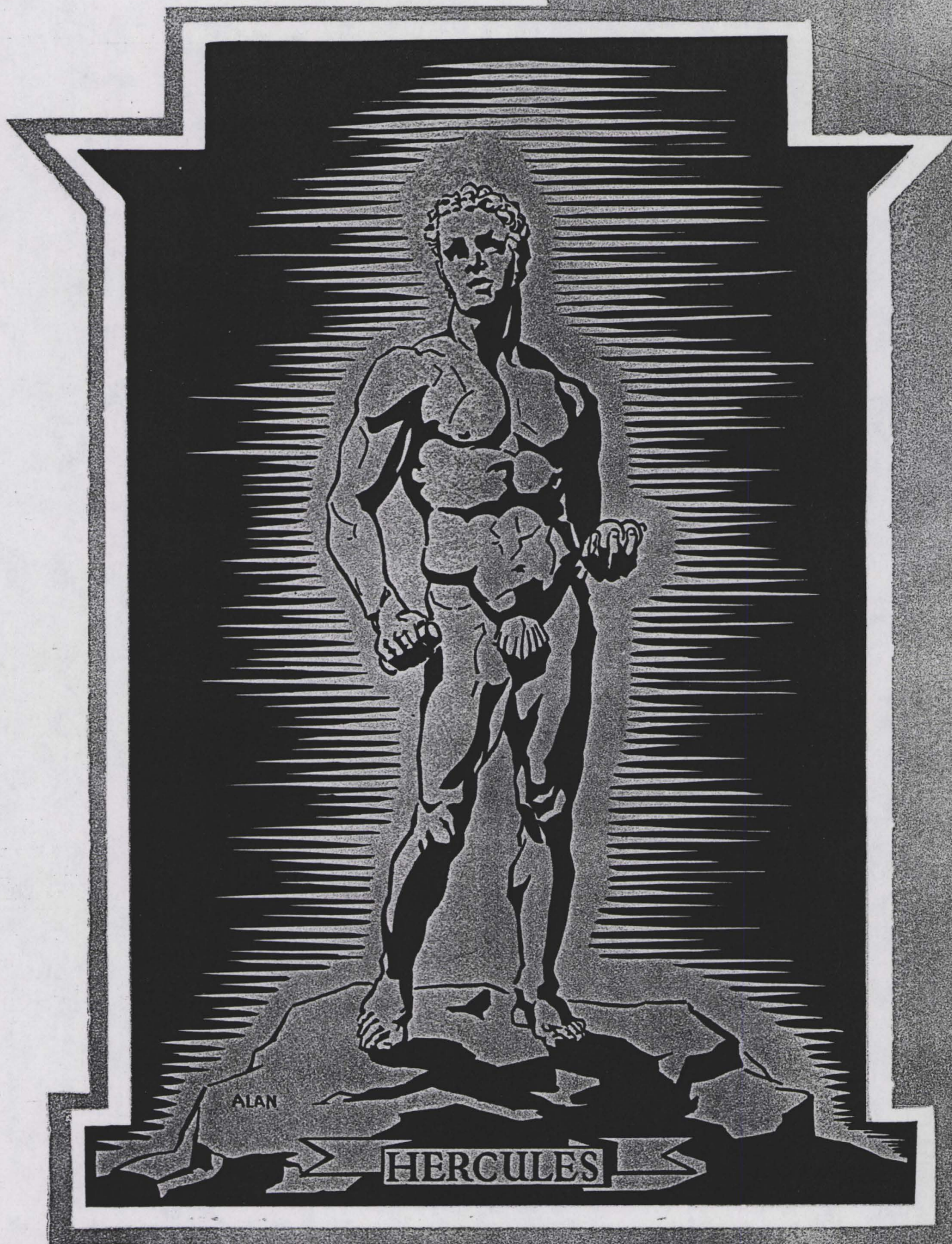
## *Junior-Senior Banquet*
