UNDER the inspiring leadership and supervision of a capable Council, the Carbon Student Body has progressed through an enjoyable year of school.

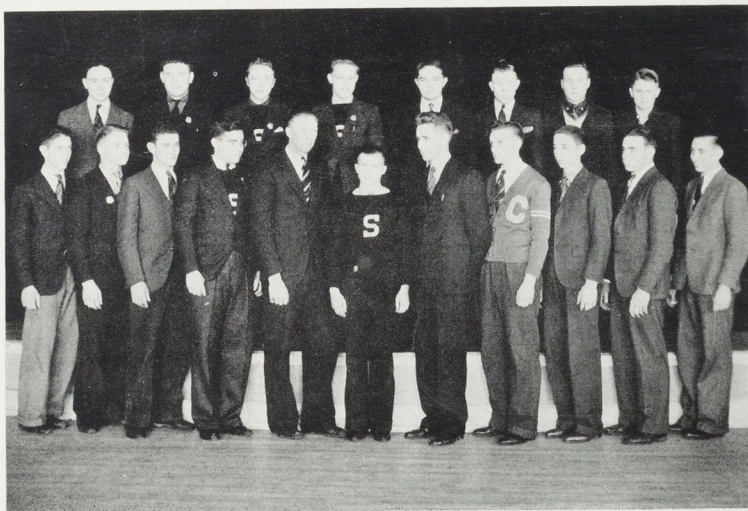

Seniors

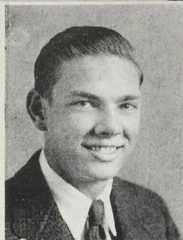
WITH proud heads go the seniors, out of their castle gates of high school life, their armor shining and their spirits high to find new fields to conquer.

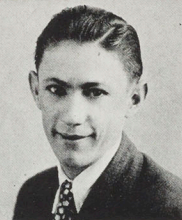
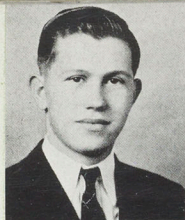
Juniors

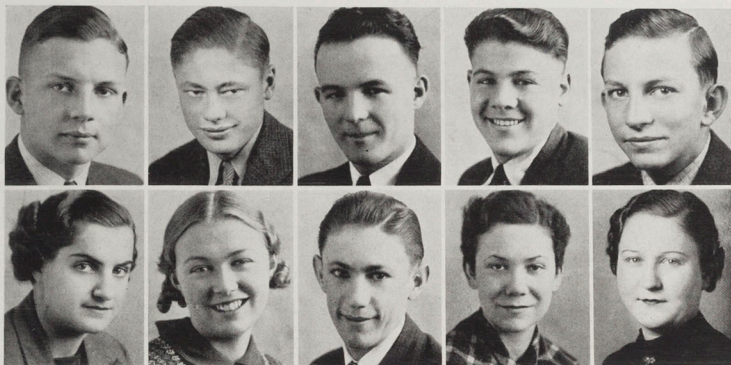
Musical Activities

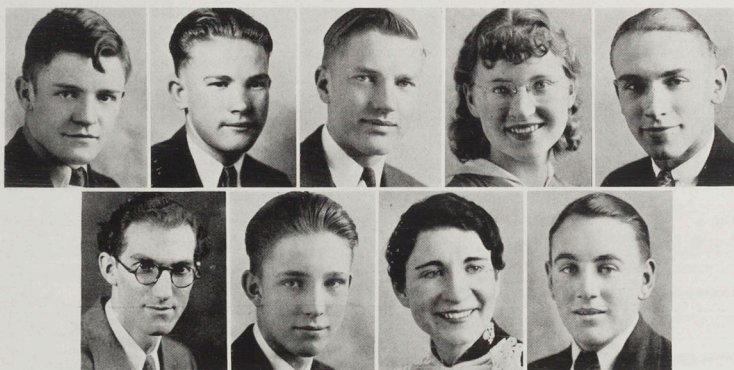

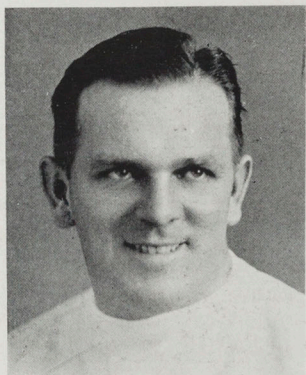

Athletics

DURING the school year 1936-37, the Carbon Student Body repeated many of its stellar accomplishments of other years in various athletic endeavors, and the closing day of school concluded one of the most successful sport campaigns in the annals of the school's history.

Perhaps most significant in the strong march to new sporting triumphs is the imposing array of new intramural activities introduced for the student body's direct benefit. The new opportunities enabled students to participate in virtually every known sport and brought about one of the highest standards of perfection in athletics the school has ever witnessed.

Without question, the outstanding achievement on the school's 1936 athletic calendar was the impressive record hung up by the blue and white football eleven. Although the Carbonites were off to a slow start in the Carbon-Emery Basketball chase due to the excessive length of the football season, the Dinosaurs were able to capture second place in the league standings. George Young, former hoop star from Utah State Agricultural College, took over the helm this year as head basketball coach.

Another major sport on the school calendar the past year was tennis. In 1936, our net team captured three firsts in the B.Y.U. relay meet and then won two runnerup titles in the state track and field meet in Salt Lake City.

Other minor sports that are rapidly becoming popular with local sports fans and participants are baseball, table tennis, boxing, wrestling, golf, badminton, volley ball, soccer, horse shoe pitching, and archery.

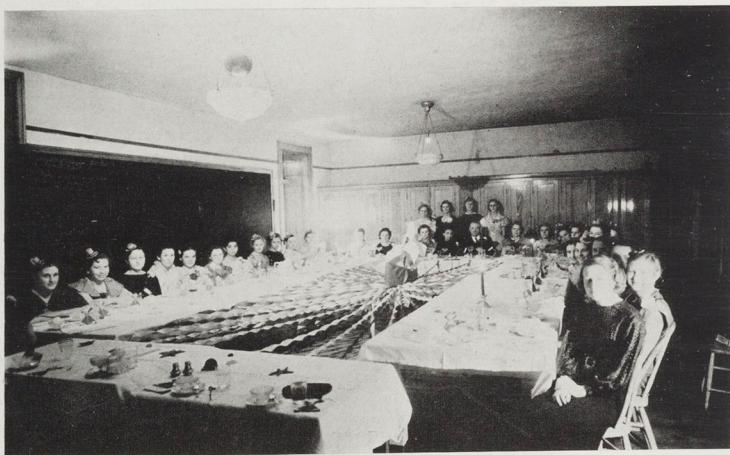
Sophomore Assembly Program

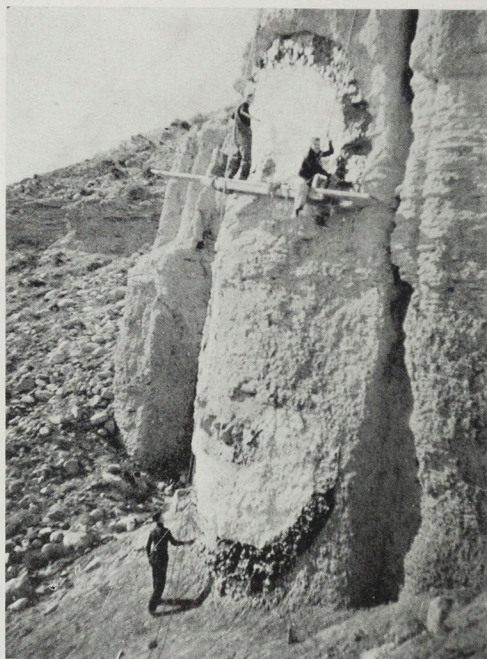
They were: Vera Xenakis, Elizabeth Mathis, Wanda Williams, Deon Chapman, and Dorothy Jorgensen.

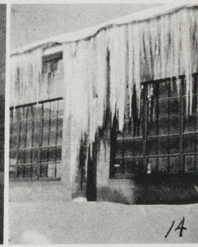
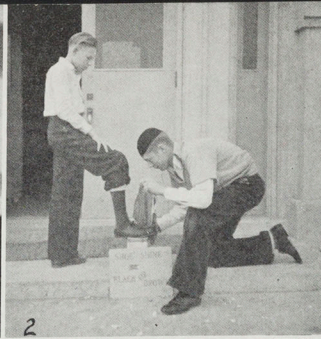

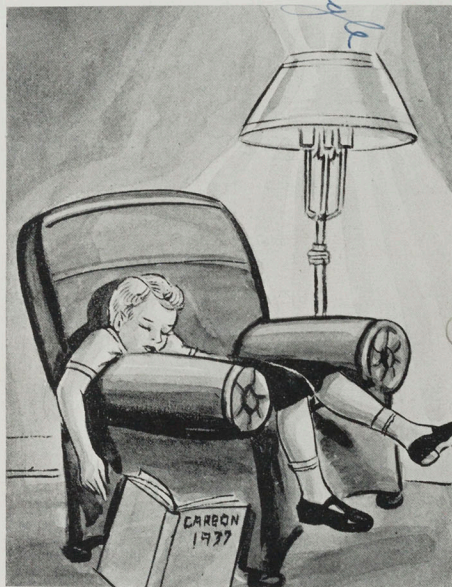
