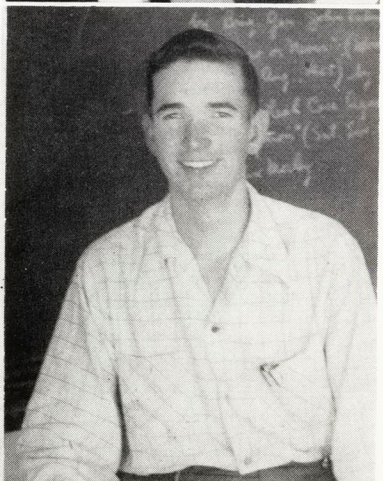
Homecoming was a gala event, with the alumnae joining in the festivities wholeheartedly.

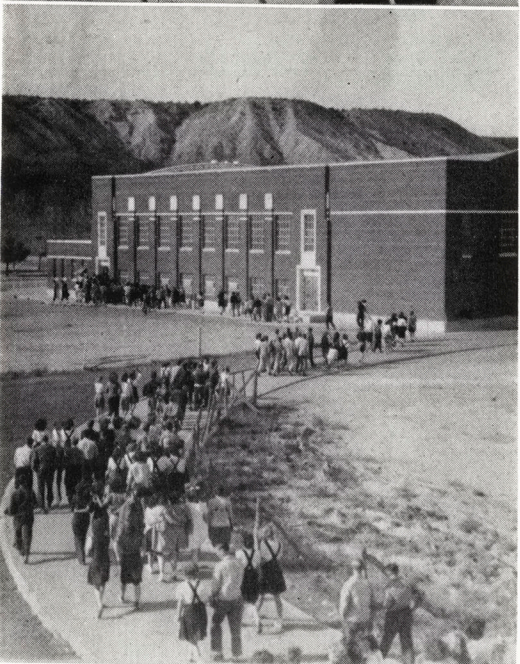
NOV. 19.—The newly organized Eaglette club enjoyed a colorful banquet for the college football team at the Park View Gardens tonight. More power to you, Eagles.

Busy throughout the year participating in other assemblies, Peppers worked determinedly to give a pleasing performance in their competitive assembly.

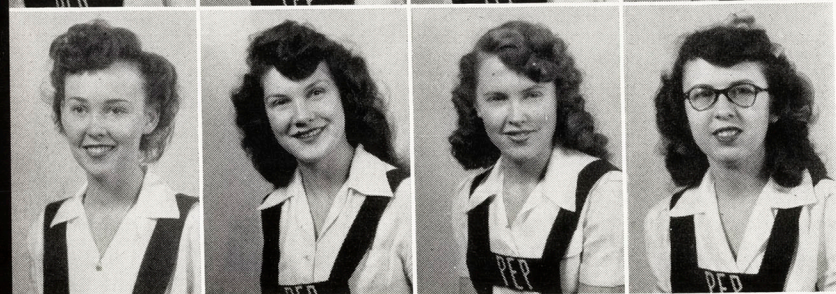

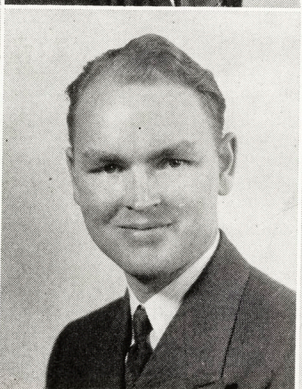
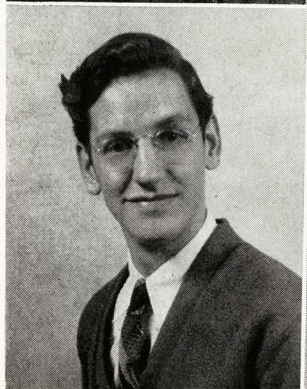
As always the Senate Club had an outstanding year at Carbon. The Homecoming Float, Trio contest, and Pep-Senate banquet were only some of their many activities.

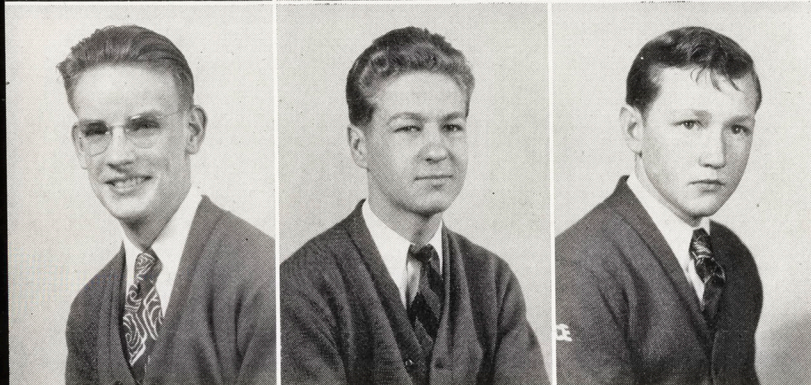

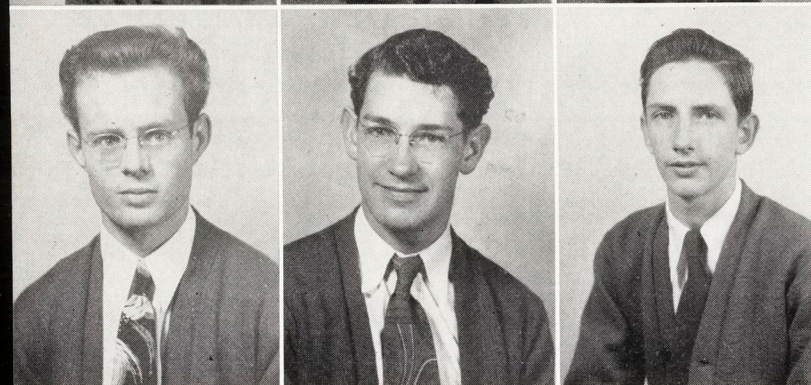

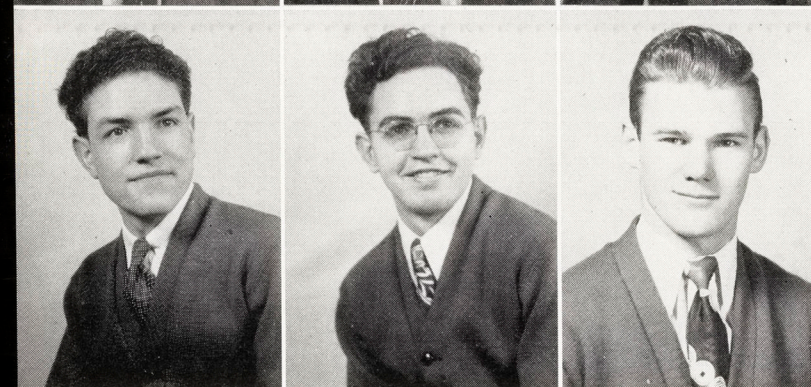

All in the club had a very successful and enjoyable year under the qualified leadership of Morris McNary and the resourceful guidance of Jackson Jewkes.

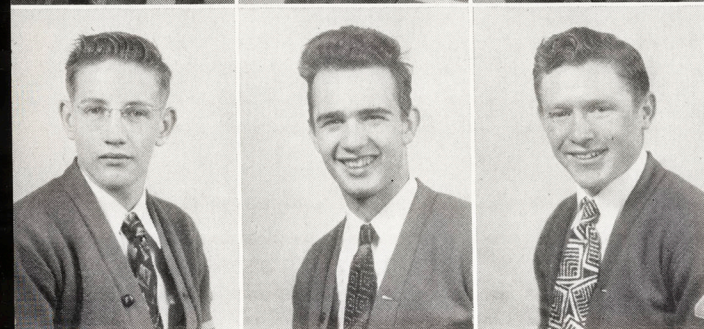

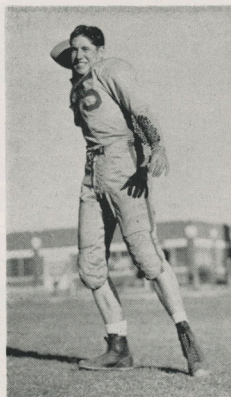
For the first time since the war, Carbon College had enough men for an all-College football team.

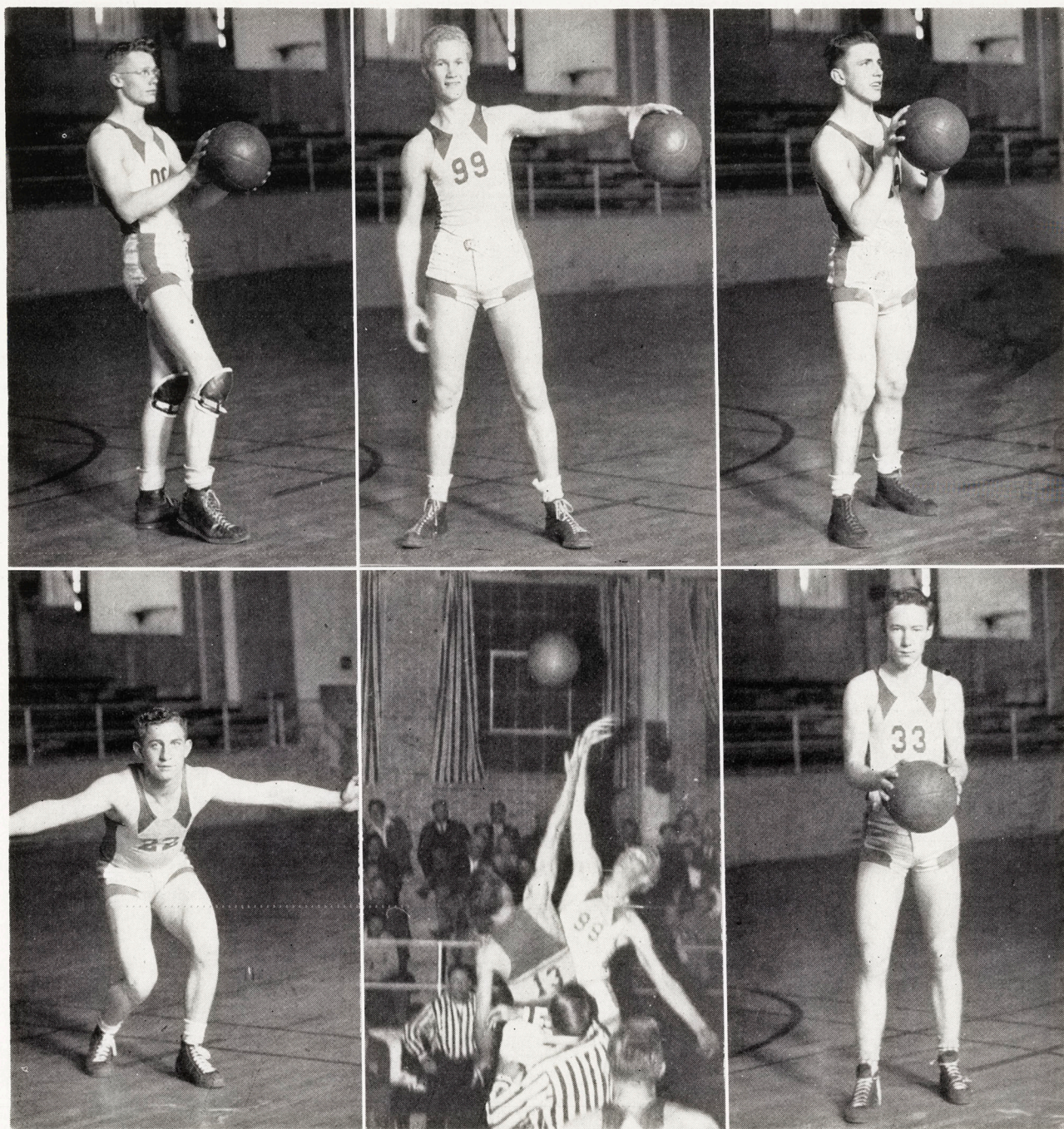
This year's squad was made up mostly of juniors with only four lettermen returning from last year's squad.
