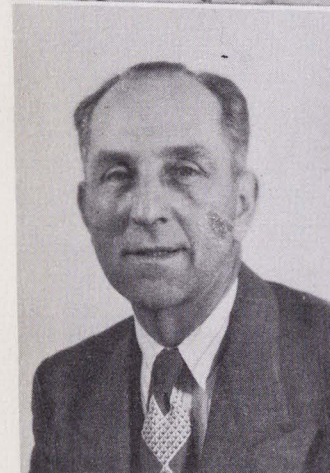
PRESIDENT JONES

The road to outstanding success in club activities was well laid out by the 1949-50 members of the Athletic Club. Achievements reached will be difficult to match in following years.



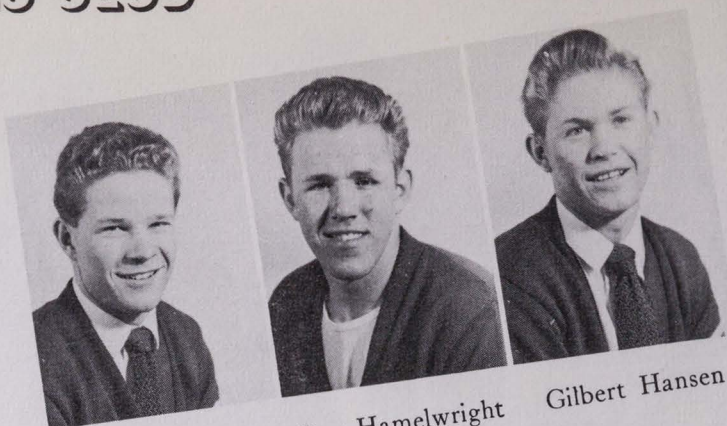

The Pep competitive assembly ranked as equal with those of the past in being original, educational, and entertaining.



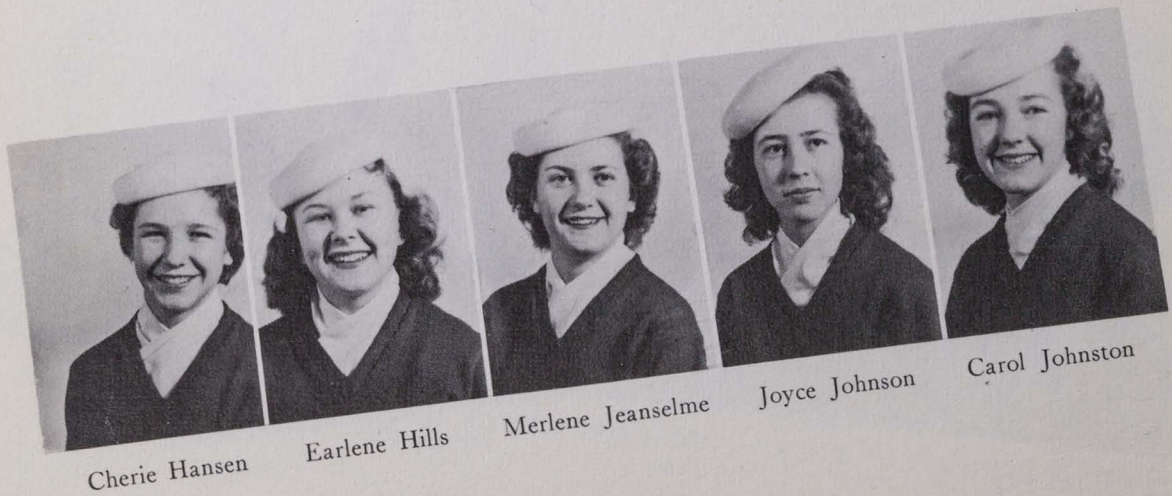
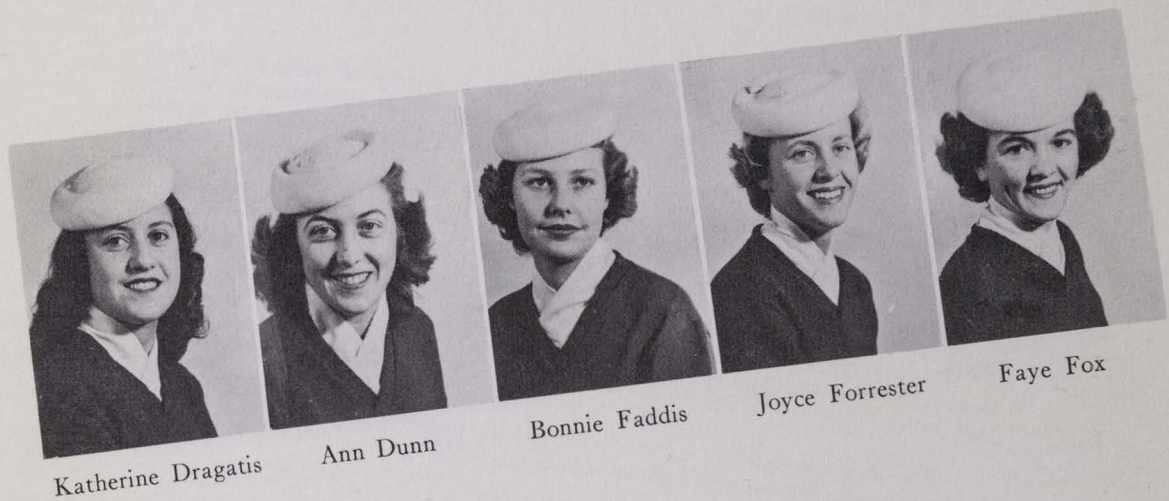

Led by All-Conference center Tom Steele, who captured every conference scoring record but one, the Eagles showed the fight, spirit, and scoring punch of a championship team.

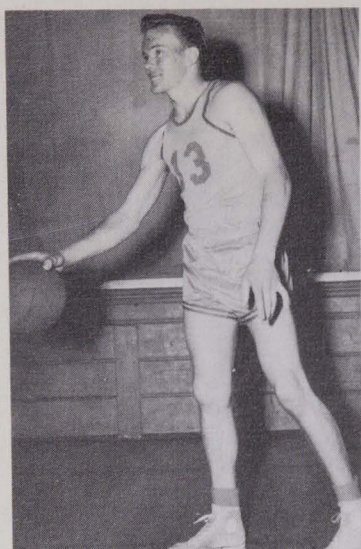
Two other Eagle players, Daryl Nord and Geary McCandless, also gained All-Conference recognition.

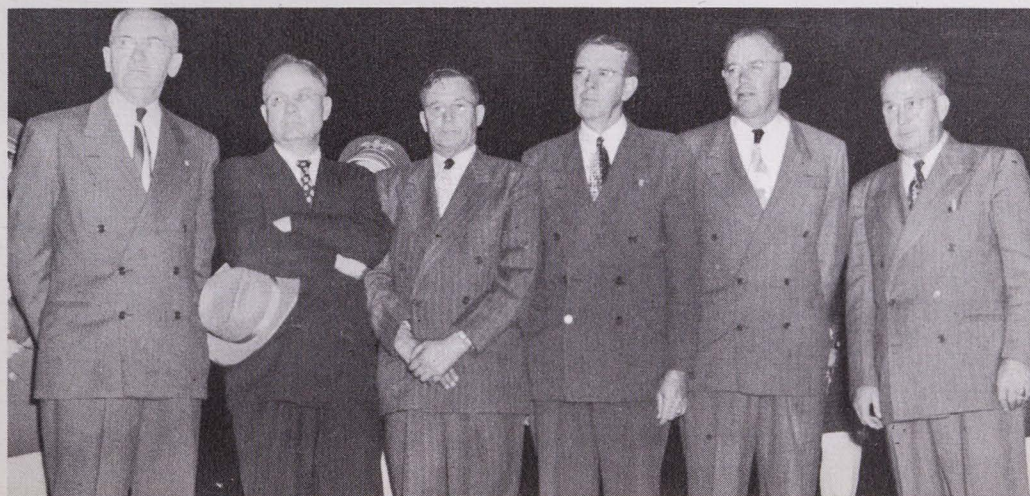

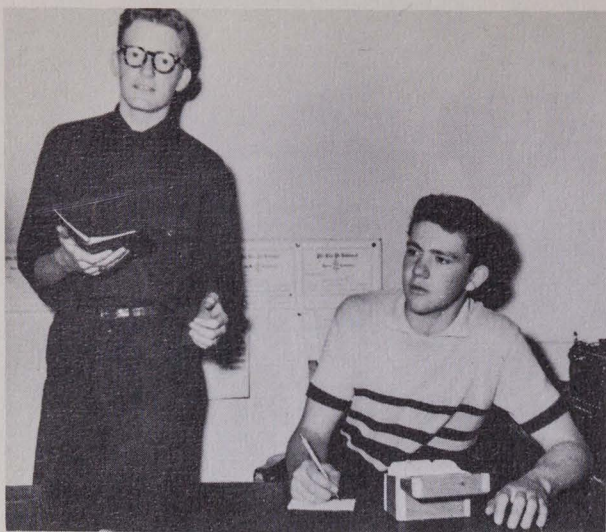
The Carbon College speech department not only traveled more extensively this year than ever before, but also brought home more honors and more experience than heretofore.
