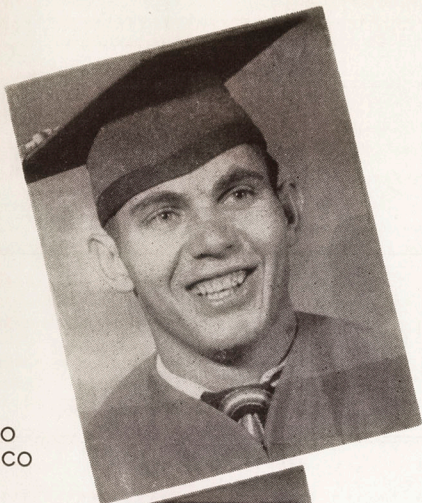
Connie Platis, sophomore candidate, was chosen Homecoming Queen.

Many returning veterans, both sophomores and freshmen, were welcomed back this year.

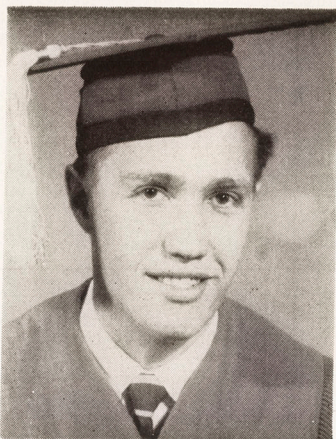
During "Frosh Week" the sophs really showed their superiority. Their kangaroo court, "When In Rome, Do As the Romans Do," was a howling success.

Graduation was a wonderful climax to the memorable, happy years at good old Carbon Junior College.

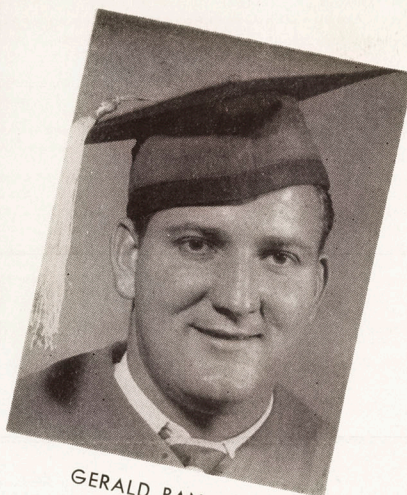

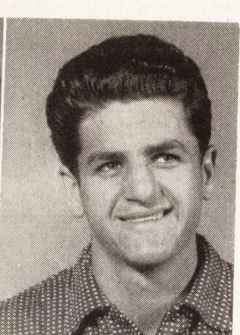
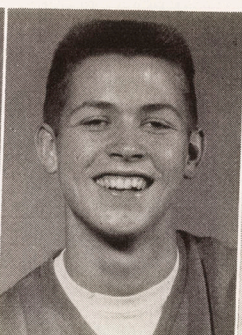
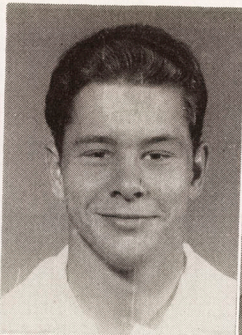
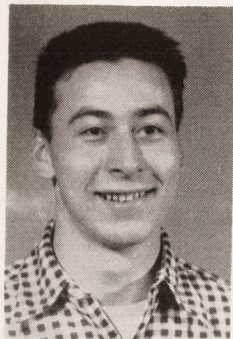
Freshmen

There were Juniors participating in every sport on the Carbon calendar and many of these athletes were outstanding. Juniors took part in all the activities at Carbon.

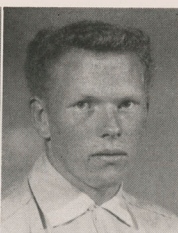

One hundred dollars of the club's money, earned by selling candy at the football and basketball games, was donated to the "Save Carbon Fund."

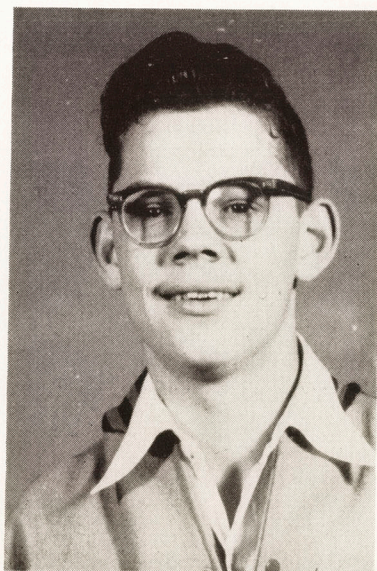

Each week in the Carbonicle, the A. W. S. sponsored a special column in which they discussed problems important to the girls at Carbon, and also to the boys.

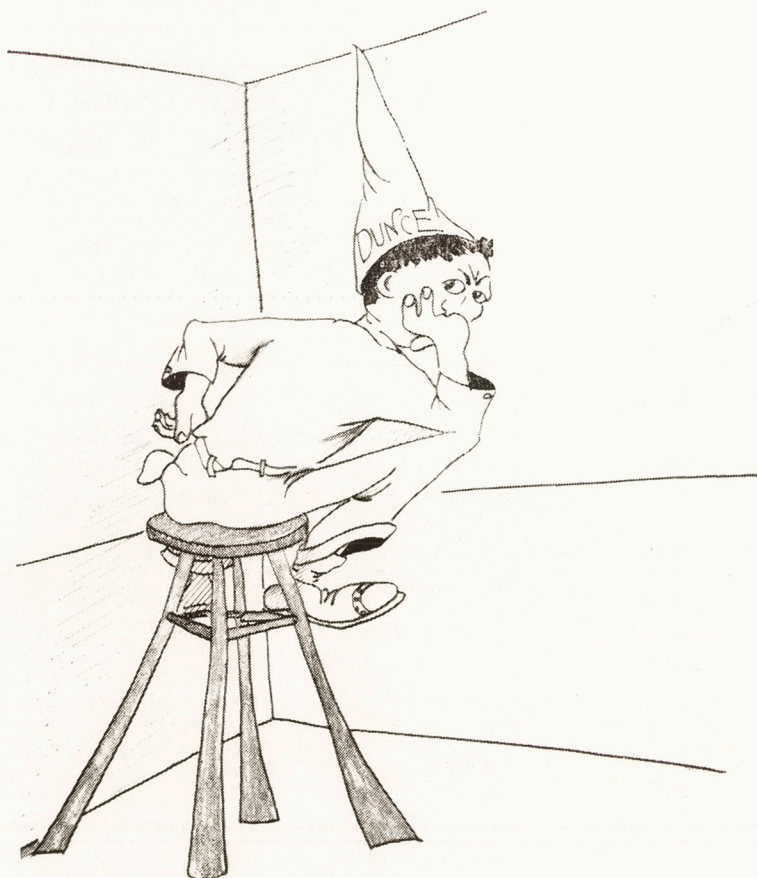

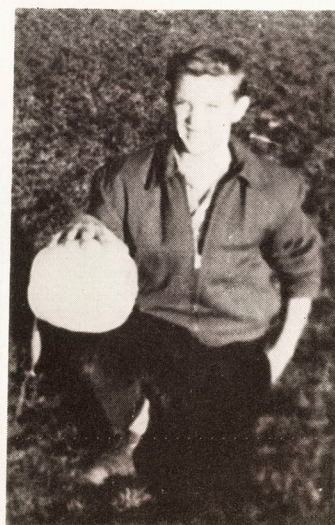
COLLEGE FOOTBALL

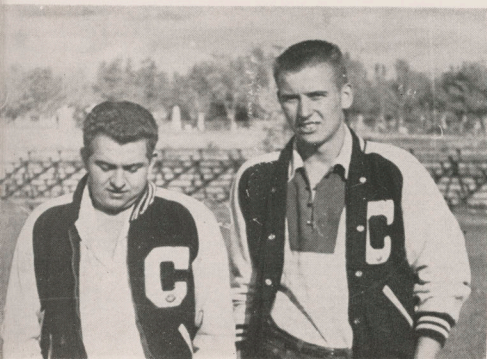
HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL

Those seasons come, however, and the Carbon aggregation was always in the game to win, and proved a great credit to Carbon.

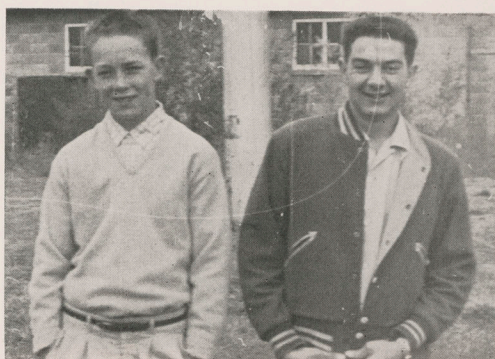

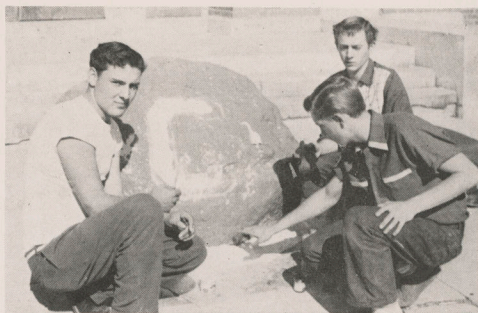
Calendar of Events
