Jan. 8, 1904.

On Jan. 6th, President Kerr called a meeting of the presidents of the different class organizations for the purpose of considering the question of chapel exercises primarily from the student's point of view. It appearing that the students would derive benefits from participating in chapel work, and the class presidents favoring the plan, meetings of the different class organizations were held on Jan. 8th, and the question submitted for the consideration of the students as to whether they desired to take part in the chapel exercises by having representatives of the different classes deliver addresses on one or two days of each week.

On Jan. 8th at four P. M. the class presidents reported as follows:

Geneva Egbert reported that the senior class, on account of the extra work incident to preparing for commencement exercises, did not feel disposed to take any part whatever in chapel work.

Walter Porter reported that the juniors preferred not to assume the responsibility of appearing before the student body in chapel for two reasons: 1. Incompetency. 2 Lack of time to give necessary preparation for the work.

Preston Peterson reported that the freshman class felt that it was a great responsibility and that they would prefer not to attempt the work, but would be willing to do so if the other classes did.

E. M. Crawford reported that the second year class unanimously favored the plan, and were willing to select representatives from the class as might be desired.
