## Not All Lawyers Read John Grisham: An Exploration of the Reading Habits of Pre-Law Students and Attorneys

## Introduction

This project explores the reading habits of pre-law students at USU and three attorneys. Pre-law students and lawyers are expected to read a lot.

- Do their intensive reading schedules influence their desire to read for pleasure?
- What do pre-law students and lawyers read for pleasure?
- Do these people even have enough time to read for pleasure?

This research questions if the amount of required reading diminishes the participants' desire to read for pleasure.

This research fills a gap as studies about how reading demands affect individuals' desire to read for pleasure do not exist.

## Utah State University

### Methods

This research was performed using a mixed methodology.

- 1. Pre-law students took a Qualtrics survey.
- 2. Interviews were conducted with the lawyer participants.


Research questions asked about academic, professional, and personal reading habits.

### Results


- 40% of students noted the amount of required reading is "more than expected."
- Students read an average of 1-2 hours a day for pleasure.
- Lawyer participants read a variety of genres and authors.
- Student and attorney participants continue to enjoy reading.
- No participants have considered switching their focus because of reading requirements.

How would you describe your enjoyment level of reading as a college student?




Enjoyment level of reading as a college student at USU.

## Conclusions

- Lawyer participants enjoy reading science fiction. None mentioned John Grisham.
