Dear President Kerr:-

I am just informed that there is a vacancy in your Department of Biology, and that Mr. E. D. Ball, of our College and Station, has applied for the place.

I am very glad to recommend Mr. Ball to you as one who has been for a number of years Chief Assistant to the Professor of Biology and Entomology and who has also been connected with the regular Experiment Station work.
