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RESOLUTIONS OF THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

April 5, 1897.-

It was moved and carried that the requirements for examination in any subject for the State diploma of grammar grade, be the same as those in the same subject for the State diploma of high school grade.

May 17, 1897.-

It was moved and carried that the requirements for State certificates of grammar grade be those now specified by law for the high school certificates.

June 30, 1897.-

It was moved and carried that persons holding five year State certificates and applying for a renewal of the same, be required to pass an examination in algebra, English grammar, and physical geography.

Sept. 13, 1897.-

On motion the following rule was adopted: "Candidates for grammar grade certificates are required to attain an average per cent in all subjects of 70 per cent, those for the State diplomas of grammar grade an average of 80 per cent, and those for high school diplomas an average of 85 per cent, and that no candidate for the grammar certificate be allowed to fall below 50 per cent in any subject, and no candidate for grammar or high school diploma be allowed to fall below 60 per cent.

Jan. 29, 1898.-

Dr. Millsbaugh moved that graduates of the three years' normal course of the University of Utah who apply for diplomas from this Board, shall be required to take examination in English literature and the history and science of education before being granted a State grammar grade diploma. The motion was carried.

June 21, 1898.-

Dr. Tanner moved that applicants who have passed successful examinations in reading, spelling, English grammar, geography, arithmetic, physiology and hygiene, and United States history, under city and county boards of examination, be allowed by this Board credits therefor when presenting evidence of their success in the subjects so passed.

June 21, 1898.-

It was the expressed sentiment of the Board that before any applicant should be granted a certificate or a diploma, he must appear personally before the Board or its chairman.

June 24, 1899.-

Dr. Kingsbury moved that it be made the rule of the Board to require college physics of all applicants for the diploma of high school grade. The motion carried.

June 15, 1900.-

Dr. Tanner moved that holders of the Four Year Normal certificate from the University of Utah, after having had at least two years successful experience in teaching in this State, shall be entitled to a State diploma of grammar grade. The motion was so decided.

Dec. 8, 1900.-

Mr. Nelson moved that hereafter no credits be allowed for work done in any summer school, unless such summer school is connected with a reputable institution and is under its direction, and that the credits be such as are counted toward graduation in that institution. Carried.

May 14, 1901.-

It was moved and carried that no more applications for State teachers certificates and diplomas be considered, until the Board shall have, at some future meeting, taken into consideration the entire question of accepting credits, in lieu of examination by the Board, from schools other than the State University.

Dec. 6, 1902.-

It was moved and carried that hereafter the chairman communicate direct with reliable persons having knowledge of the applicant's teaching qualifications, and from them get a statement of the applicant's teaching ability.

May 23, 1903.- The chairman was appointed to issue a circular letter to all the county superintendents, informing them that correspondence work can not be accepted in lieu of the regular county teachers' examination.
