U. A. C. FOLKS MAKE BIG HIT

Other Cities Feel Better After Seeing Babette.

It is the first time that anything in the form of a dramatic or opera company from this institution has ever made a success of so extended a trip as that recently completed by the Babette Company. In each of the cities where the opera was presented, Brigham, Salt Lake, Provo and Ogden, the company met with every success hoped for and judging from the newspaper comments the affair was more of a success than was expected by the majority of those who witnessed the production.

The company left Logan on the noon train, February 9, and after a four hours wait at Cache Junction for No. 10, south bound, they started for Brigham City. At this place there were sleighs awaiting the troop at the depot and in these the "birds" were conveyed to the opera house. A full house greeted them as the curtain rose on the first act. The audience was appreciative throughout the performance and all seemed to highly enjoy the affair. Here as in all other places Miss Cardon received a great amount of praise, but the entire cast and chorus came in for their due amount. Prof. Thatcher, especially, won the admiration of every audience, and this he should rightly do.

At 11:15 the next day the travelers arrived in Salt Lake City. After spending the day in divers ways it was in rather a timid manner that they prepared for the evening's performance. However, when a large and sympathetic audience immediately showed their vast appreciation of the company's efforts they soon took on life and as many of the on-lookers expressed themselves, "One soon forgot that it was an amateur production, so well was it carried out." This was the

best performance given on the trip, and the papers of Salt Lake were very generous in their praise of Prof. Thatcher and his large company.

In Provo, the next night, a crowded house again greeted the performers. The B. Y. U. students were there in full and the entire audience pronounced "Babette" a success in every way. A very disagreeable event was that after the performance the company had to walk, through rain and mud, to their cars, which were sidetracked about half a mile from the station and in doing so, several members contracted severe colds.

A fair house was present at Ogden and the usual comments were offered.

The company arrived home on Saturday morning rather the wore for wear, but at the same time jovial and feeling that the whole trip was more of a success than had ever been hoped for.

As has been said, all newspapers and witnesses pronounced the production of "Babette" as given by the U. A. C. Folks equal to any they had yet seen and as something of which any school could be well proud of. We take this occasion to thank any and all who aided us in making it successful, and we will welcome any of the schools who helped us if they feel it advisable to count Logan in their list of stops when they, too, are out on such a trip.

Second Performance in Logan Successful.

All that was said in last issue and more is due the gallant performers in the best college affair ever witnessed in this city which was given for the second time last Monday night at the Thatcher Opera House. Townspeople crowded the house to see the much talked of comic opera, "Babette," in which the U. A. C. Folks have been so successful. Surely after such success the Music Department can feel equal to anything great along these lines.

Everyone is of the same opinion. "It was simply great."

Prof. Thatcher for his untiring efforts is to be complimented. It may require lots of trouble, work and worry to produce a good athletic team, but to handle eighty inexperienced young people in such a large undertaking so well, is something few men can do, and we again compliment Professor Thatcher and we feel that to him is due the loyal support of every student in any future undertaking. Of course Prof. Thatcher could not do all this alone. He must have great assistance and support. This he had in abundance from the man who played the "clari-o-net" to the leading "loidey."

The performance last Monday night was a vast improvement over that of a week before and showed that the trip south did much for its betterment. The chorus felt more at home, the principals did decidedly better and the orchestra played with more ease. The company's hard work has by no means amounted to naught.

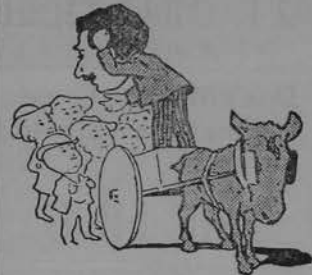
