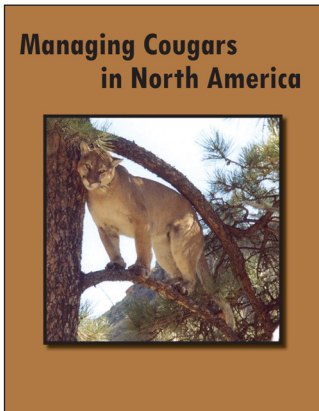


# Managing Cougars in North America

Revisions underway



In 2011, the Jack H. Berryman Institute, in cooperation with the Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies Cougar Working Group, published “*Managing Cougars of North America*” (available through [www.berrymaninstitute.org](http://www.berrymaninstitute.org) or Amazon.com). Over 5,000 copies of the book were distributed. Because the science regarding management of cougars has dramatically grown over the last decade, the partners are again collaborating on a revision of the 2011 book. Currently, the chapters are undergoing a peer-review process through *Human–Wildlife Interactions*. Jonathan A. Jenks, South Dakota State University, is serving as the editor-in-chief for the peer-review process and will be the editor for the revised book.

We anticipate the new book will be released by the Berryman Institute Press in late 2020.

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**JONATHAN A. JENKS** has been a faculty member at South Dakota State University (SDSU) since 1991, where he focused his studies on deer ecology and management in the Northern Great Plains and mountain lion ecology in the Black Hills of South Dakota. His research has included evaluating movements, home range, and survival of various large mammal species. He received his B.S. degree (1984) in wildlife science from Unity College in Maine and his M.S. (1986) and Ph.D. (1991) degrees at the University of Maine and Oklahoma State University, respectively. He became a member of The Wildlife Society in 1983 and received “Fellow” status in 2006. He also became a Distinguished Professor of Natural Resource Management at SDSU in 2006. He has worked with >70 M.S. and Ph.D. students, published >200 scientific papers, and received >\$16 million in grant and contract funding during his years at SDSU.
