## PRES. PETERSON RETURNS FROM EASTERN MEET

Attends Annual Meet of College Presidents at Chicago

Secretary of Agriculture Commends Utah's State Council Plan

President Elmer G. Peterson has just returned from the East where he attended the Annual Conference of College Presidents held at Chicago and the Conference of the American Country Life Association held at St. Louis. While away, President Peterson also attended the industrial symposium of President Stratton D. Brooks of the University of Missouri.

In a report of his trip abroad to the college faculty today, President Peterson declared a survey of recent training facilities covering a section of the country which he saw while in Chicago shows that attendance at the colleges and universities is steadily increasing. The University of Texas shows a decrease of twenty per cent in its enrollment. Increases have occurred in cities where there have been county balanced by large decreases in rural areas.

Schools of Medicine and Education show substantial increases, says President Peterson, although without exception, there has been a decrease in courses in agriculture, engineering and in industrial and technical work. In areas around large markets, such as in the Chicago districts, these subjects show a slight increase.

Dispersed commendation of Utah's plan to give its agricultural faculties to the organization of a state council of agriculture is reported by President Peterson. The following statement from H. H. Wallace, secretary of Agriculture, to President Peterson who is chairman of the National Council, indicates how the Department of Agriculture views this movement.

"I am quite sure that the council is soundly based on Page 815."

The Faculty Women  
Increase Loan Fund

Faculty dollars were added to the Women's Loan fund of this institution as a result of the meeting given by the Faculty Women's League at the Home Economics Club, last Friday from 2:30 to 4:30. Plans at tables were sold to the members and to townsmen for \$50. These were used for playing piano and entertaining. Members who could not be present sent their money, and contributions from the second price up to \$10 were received.

This Loan Fund is for the purpose of helping women students, particularly Seniors, to remain until their school work is completed. It is used in the form of a \$50 scholarship to worthy students, but in April of 1921 it became a Loan Fund. Since then it has increased to \$311. The annual members of the College are now invited to contribute \$1 each and thus enlarge it further. The money is loaned to students on a 10 percent without bond. Her students are now making use of it in amounts ranging from \$25 to \$100.

Bacteriologist Wanted  
By U. S. Civil Service  
Examination Will Be Held For  
Bureau of Plant Industry

The United States Civil Service Commission announces the following list of competitive examinations: Assistant Bacteriologist. Receipt of applications will close December 1, 1923. The examination will be held at the Bureau of Plant Industry, Department of Agriculture, at exchange salaries ranging from \$2,840 to \$2,560 a year, plus the increase of \$20 a month provided by Congress, and vacancies in positions requiring similar qualifications.

Candidates are to assist in the prosecution of investigations upon fruit and vegetable utilization, particularly upon diseases and insect pests. This work will involve the carrying on of routine studies, the development of methods, and the performance of carefully conducted experiments, and the collection and analysis of bacteriological data. The duties of the position require knowledge of electricity and mechanical ability. Competitors will be rated on education, training, and experience, and publications or thesis to be filed with the application.

Full information and application blanks may be obtained from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or the secretary of the board of U. S. Civil Service examinations at the post office or customhouse in any city.

## SMOKING ON THE CAMPUS

At least a few students at the college seem to have forgotten that Aggie tradition which says there shall be no smoking on the campus. "Nicotine Point" has changed its location from the brow of the hill, however, and is now located behind the Ag-Engineering building where, when weather will permit, students may be seen puffing their "daily dozen".

It is just such disrespect as this which makes for the demoralization of that wholesome spirit for which the college is noted. The students who persist in smoking on the campus need not have gone off behind a building like errand school children afraid of the rebukes of a strict teacher. College men are supposed to have a high sense of honor, and real Aggies are supposed to have the traditions of the college. But traditions are few, but we should guard them carefully, lest, through abuse, they should cease to exist.

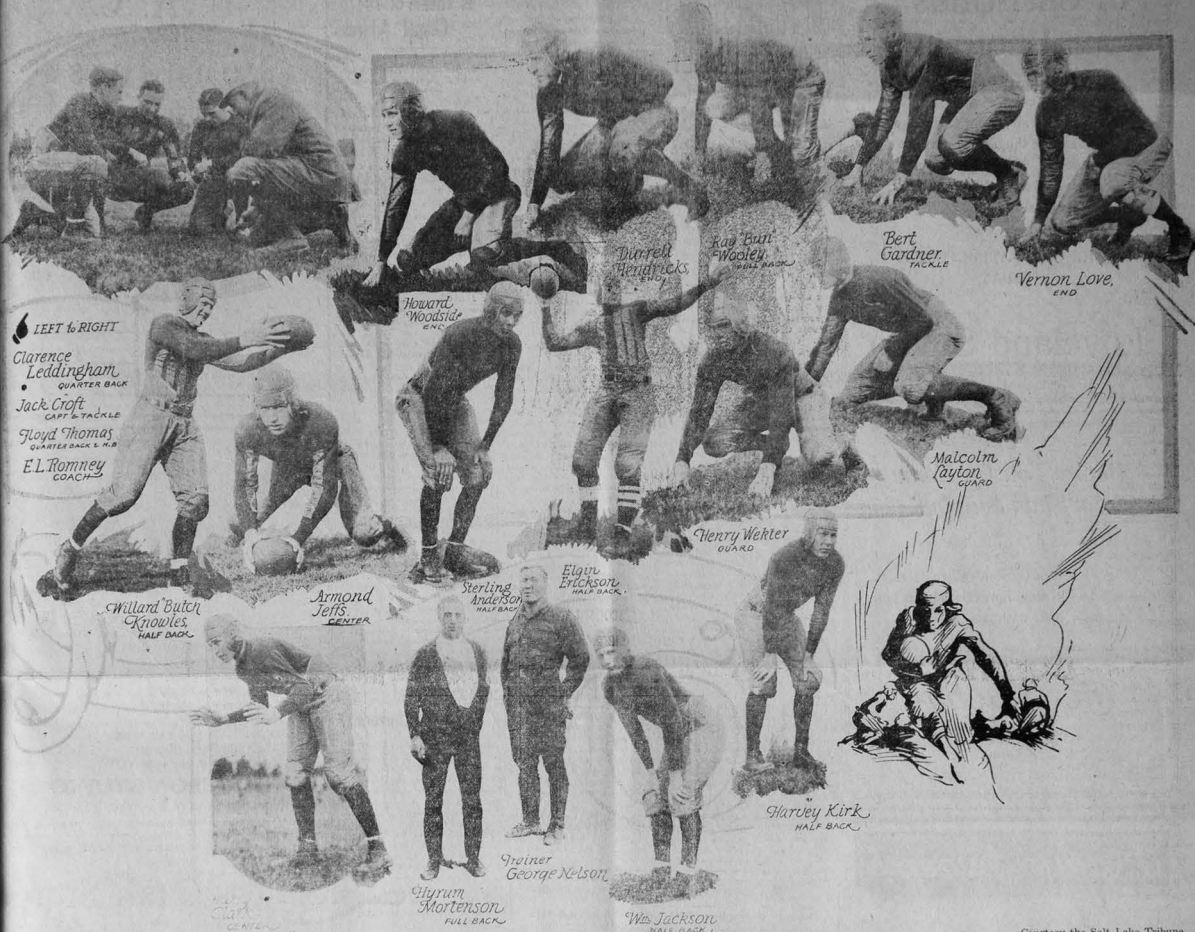

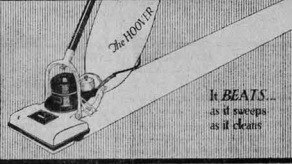

## PROF. PETERSON RETURNS FROM ANNUAL MEET

### The Experiment Station Head Attends Chicago Convention

### Utah Stations Compare Favorably With Those of Eastern States

Director William Peterson of the Utah Experiment Station returned from attending the annual meetings of the Directors of Experiment Stations held in Chicago. On the way to Chicago he stopped over for a day at North Platte, Nebraska, where a branch experiment station is located, which is devoted to experiments with beef cattle. One experiment that seemed to show promise was the feeding of alfalfa. Calves were weaned at an early date and fed so that maturity was reached at the earliest date. With this treatment 15, 15, and 15 months old steers looked as good as one 2-year-old steer in the West. For Nebraska this forced feeding can be done with profit, but an experiment along this line should be worked out in the West where we have good pastures and ranges.

An interesting paper was given at Chicago on "Pastures," which brought out the fact that the carrying capacity of our western pastures is greater than that of the large grass sections of Kansas, where the carrying capacity is 25 acres per head. North Dakota has two pounds on natural grass of 50, 70, and 100 acres on which they pastured 20 to the field. The 70-acre field was required to support the 100 acres was detrimental on account of drought. The 70-acre field was divided into three parts with one part pastured at a time, and from this arrangement the pasture could carry 10 steers where it had been carrying only 10 when pastured all at the same time. Pasturing is very important phase of our agriculture and should have consideration over the whole country.

Another paper analyzed the amount of gas and gasoline in a ton of straw, "18,000 cubic feet of gas or 32 gallons of gasoline can be taken from a ton of straw," the paper stated.

Much of our experimental work is technical and requires highly trained men with efficient helpers and good equipment with which to work. Nearly all of the experiment stations are handicapped because of lack of

funds to take up important problems occurring in each state. The Purcell Bill if passed by Congress this winter, will give additional federal aid to all experiment stations and make it possible to extend experimentation to many needed fields.

In talking with the directors of other stations, Director Peterson found that the Utah Station compared very favorably with the others in the character and amount of work being done.

## BABSON OFFERS STUDENTS PRIZE

### Essay Prizes Amounting to One Thousand and Fifty Dollars Will Be Given

One thousand and fifty dollars in prizes is offered by H. W. Babson, founder and president of the Babson Statistical Association, for the best two statistical essays, for the determining of the price of wheat, of cotton, or of lumber. The contest is open to all graduates or under-graduate students of American universities.

In selecting the subjects named, the donor has in mind the national interests that will influence countries in the choice of one or another of the commodities. "Wheat," he believes, will be chosen not only by students coming from the wheat regions, but also by those living in near cities where considerable shipping is done; likewise "cotton" should appeal to students of Southern cultivation, as well as to those of the cotton manufacturing districts of both New England and the South, and "lumber" while it has a more or less universal interest, especially on account of the present housing situation, should appeal particularly to the West Coast students.

Two prizes are offered: (1) a prize of \$500 for the best essay submitted by either an undergraduate or a graduate student at any American university; (2) a prize of \$400 for the best essay by an undergraduate student at any American university.

## Unknown Persons Try To Wreck U. of C. Paper

Univ. of Cal., Berkeley, California's literary magazine, "The Occident," that was circulated today was nearly wrecked in the making two days ago when someone broke into the print-shop and attempted to destroy the type and type. Who the person was or what his motive is not known.

The attempt was not successful until the following morning, but no real damage had been done. The magazine was ready for circulation at the time set.

## Monroe Doctrine Is Theme of The Chapel Address

### Nephi L. Morris Is Thankful For Document Which Has Kept U. S. Out of Europe

"We should thank God at this time for the three thousand miles of turbulent water that separates America from Europe and for the Monroe Doctrine that, for one hundred years has kept Europe out of the New World," was the keynote of the remarks of Hon. Nephi L. Morris of Salt Lake, who was the speaker at chapel services in the A. C. Auditorium here Monday.

After commenting on the many advantages and the vast resources of America as compared with the rest of the world, Mr. Morris called attention to the fact that December 2 is the centenary of the announcement by President James Monroe, of the doctrine that bears his name. He traced the development of America since its discovery by Columbus, showing how the possession of the continent has gradually developed until soon after the Napoleon wars when the Spanish colonies in Mexico and South America asked for the disposition of Spain. It was the attempt of Spain, backed by the Holy Alliance, to regain those colonies that called forth the warning of President Monroe.

The speaker traced the history of the doctrine during the turbulent century since its announcement. He emphasized especially the successive attempts of France, Britain and Germany to override or ignore the American position, and showed how each of these attempts has been frustrated by the firmness of American presidents and diplomats in insisting upon its observance.

"The remarkable thing about it," said Mr. Morris, "is the fact that in all these hundred years, we have never had either an army or a navy sufficient to maintain the doctrine if it had been challenged by the united effort of more than one of the leading European powers."

## Sophomore Pledging at Montana University

Sophomore pledging by fraternity and societies will go on into effect at the University of Montana as soon as there are enough dormitories to house all freshman students. President, H. H. Chap announced.

"The present system has too many disadvantages," President Chap said, "and if the dormitory capacity was now large enough, we would not hesitate to put it into effect tomorrow." Just when we will be in a position to introduce the new plan, I do not know, but when the time comes, I intend to give fraternalists ample notice so they may be prepared for it.

"President Chap continued the rushing season, which, he declared, seriously upsets the studies of both the rabble and the fraternity man, and hurts the standing of the man not rushed." Under the new system the University hopes, he said, to employ trained directors and give what he said would be "better social training than the Treman could get in the fraternity house his first year."

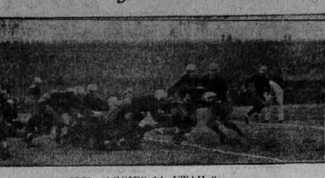
