## STUDENTS

**Good Enrollment Is Expected—Short Courses Offered By The College This Year.**

The winter quarter at the Utah Agricultural College will open Thursday, January 3, 1924, immediately following the Christmas recess, according to an announcement just issued by Dr. F. L. West dean of the faculty at the college.

The work of the winter quarter will be of the same standard as that given during the Fall quarter, says Professor West, who emphasizes the fact that the division of the school year into quarters of work has been made to enable those students who could not enter college at the opening of the fall because of financial or other reasons to begin or continue their school work later in the year.

"We expect a fairly heavy registration for the Winter Quarter," said Dr. West. "Many inquiries have already been received concerning the courses to be offered from former A. C. students, from students of other colleges and from incoming graduates. The registration will be voluntary or college grade, although a number of students of vocational grade will doubtless enter the work in farm and auto mechanics and the various vocational courses in agriculture. This condition will be just the reverse of a few years ago when thousands of students entered at the winter opening but when large groups of vocational students came in the fall."

"Every school in the college is offering courses which begin with the first semester. This condition means that only those courses which have been running since last fall will be open to students, but that a large number of courses will actually start on January 3. This makes it very convenient for students."

### Heavy Schedule For Next Year Is Outlined. Colorado Aggies And Denver U. On List

Sixteen men are to receive the all-time football award this season. These men are Captain Crow, William "Bitch" Knowles, Howard Woodside, Durrell Hendricks, Ver, Ann Love, Bert Gardner, Harry Clark, Malcom Flann, Almond "Pink" Joffe, Henry Webster, Clarence Leddingham, Lloyd Thomas, Ray "Bub" Woolley, Elgin Erickson, Sterling Anderson, and Ben Cowley. They constitute one of the best, most courageous squad of fighters that football "Bitch" has ever turned out.

Six games have been arranged for the Aggie football squad during the 1934 season and negotiations for carrying a seventh are under way. The dates upon which the games will be played are not as yet decided upon but the following schools will at some time in the fall quarter do battle with Romney's lusty warriors: Montana State College, Colorado Aggies, Denver University, The Brigham Young University, and the University of Utah, which are all conference teams and the Montana School of Mines which is non-conference.

## Romney Issues Call For Hoopsters. Two Regulars Missing From Lineup

Prospects for a winning basketball team aren't very bright for the coming season. Adapting new material to college basketball will be Romney's major problem in turning out a competitive aggregation to represent the blue and white during the year of 1934.

Two Schaub and Glynn Cooper are the big losses to our hoop department from the institution to fulfill a mission in Germany, while Cowley has transferred his course of study to the University of Utah. Schaub came to the college with an enviable scholastic record, having pulled down an all state position on the Logan "Gizzlies" Interscholastic champion, scholastic. While at the "Agiess" he was a basketball regular for several years, his freshman and sophomore year, and was elected captain for the coming year.

Cowley playing guard last year, proved to be one of the most successful men at scoring long shots and foul shots. Both Romney has worked with.

Both men are small in stature but speedy on the floor and deadly accurate at shooting baskets. They are the only losses to the "Agiess" this year but both will be especially productive of many thrilling encounters.

Most of these utility men have had considerable high school experience but lack some of the qualities necessary in carrying the burden of a regular.

Phyl Thomas, the sensation of the year on the gridiron, will be the big contribution from last year's "Freak" squad. Thomas, at guard, aggravated the varsity forwards possibly more than any one else last year, by holding them down to low scores, when trying to make an impression on the coach's mind.

Scholarship contributions this year are of the highest caliber. Elmer Sanderson, and Clifton Crowther, both persons of former state championship teams, are expected to make a strong bid for the vacancies left by Cowley and Schaub. Sanderson was selected all-state guard in 1932. Crowther came second only to Francis Gillette when contestants selected the all-state scholar team in 1931.

Cowley's presence will be missed with the prospective men in school, and states that the big problem will be those of adapting former high school men to college basketball and developing teamwork.

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## Schedule For Basketball

### Tennis, Track, Swimming And Wrestling Drawn up

The coaches of the U. A. C., the U. of U. and the B. Y. U. met last week and drew up a schedule for basketball, tennis, track, swimming and wrestling for the coming year. The initial hoop game at Logan will come on February 1 and 2 when the University of Utah Journeys to Logan to meet the University of Utah Aggies. The Aggies meet the Youngsters in Provo February 5 and 6. Utah plays the B. Y. U. aggregation on February 15 and 16 at Provo. Logan will be the scene of the next battles between the Youngsters and the Aggies on February 22 and 23. On January 25 and 26 the Youngsters play in Salt Lake, and on February 23 and 24 the Aggies and the U close the season at Salt Lake.

Five men teams will again compete in tennis this year. The opening game is at Provo, April 1 between the U. of U. and the U. of U. On April 25 the Aggie net champions will play the University in Salt Lake City. The Y will play the Aggies at Logan, May 2 while the B. Y. U. meets Utah at Salt Lake the following week. The Aggie team will journey to Provo, May 12 and Utah is scheduled to show its wares

to the Logans on May 14. The state intercollegiate track meet will be held in Logan this year, May 7. The Aggies and Utah meet in a dual meet at Salt Lake, April 26, while the B. Y. U. meets the Aggies in a similar meet at Logan, May 3. Utah has a dual meet scheduled with the Youngsters at Provo, May 10.

The Rocky Mountain conference track and field meet will be held on May 24, the place to be decided upon at the meeting of coaches in Denver next Friday and Saturday.

The state swimming meet will be held at Provo on March 15. Five men from each school will participate in the meet.

The state wrestling tournament will be staged at the University in Salt Lake, March 22. Coach Romney will journey to Denver next Friday to confer with the other coaches in the Rocky Mountain conference as to the disposition of baseball as an intercollegiate sport.
