Colorado Aggies High In Psychology Tests

Colorado Aggie students average as high in psychology as those of any school in the country from which data is available, according to tests made by Professor H. R. Lasset on 124 members of the junior and the freshman classes. The army alpha tests for intelligence, which were used in finding the mental ability of the soldiers, in training, were given to classes in freshman English and in educational psychology. The scores made compare very favorably with those of Colorado schools and of colleges and universities throughout the country. The women made, on the average, higher scores than the men, but the differences were so small that they are not important.

WEST JORDAN BOY WINS SCHOLARSHIP AT U. A. COLLEGE

Roscoe T. Pixon Winner of Union Pacific Railway Scholarship at U. A. C.

Roscoe T. Pixon of West Jordan is the winner of the Union Pacific railway scholarship, according to announcement by V. L. Martin, agricultural agent of Salt Lake county. The scholarship provides for the payment of \$15 toward the expense of the winner as a student at the college and in addition provides transportation expenses of the student from his home to the college and return.

Pixon is a student of the Jordan high school and won the scholarship as a member of the boys club in agriculture, organized by the extension service of the Utah Agricultural College.

The work undertaken by Pixon consisted of the growing of winter acres of sugar beets which yielded a total of 79.75 tons, or an average of 25.5 tons per acre. The cost of growing the beets amounted to a total of \$243.14 or \$32.71 per acre. Receipts for the beets based on last year's price will amount to \$522.50 which will leave a total net profit of \$179.35 or \$22.94 per acre.

Other boys who were also competitors were Theodore N. Hultgren, Delbert O. Thayne, Arthur R. Christensen.

Dr. E. C. Titus, chairman of the agricultural committee of the Salt Lake Chamber of Commerce, and Professor J. C. Hogenson of the Utah Agricultural College acted as judges of the contest.
