The students who have joined with him in this enterprise include Francis Wilcox, Joseph Ballinger, Pearson Ballinger, Alvin Peterson, John Croft, Ray Garner and Durrell Hendricks, all experienced players of considerable local fame.

It is perhaps somewhat of a surprise to the student body to find that Mr. Logan has been a professional actor, yet when we look back on events of the past year we can easily picture where his fine sense of the dramatic has stood him in good stead. In his official relations with the editor of Student Life, for instance, he has maintained a "stage presence" that excited the envy of the student body at large. 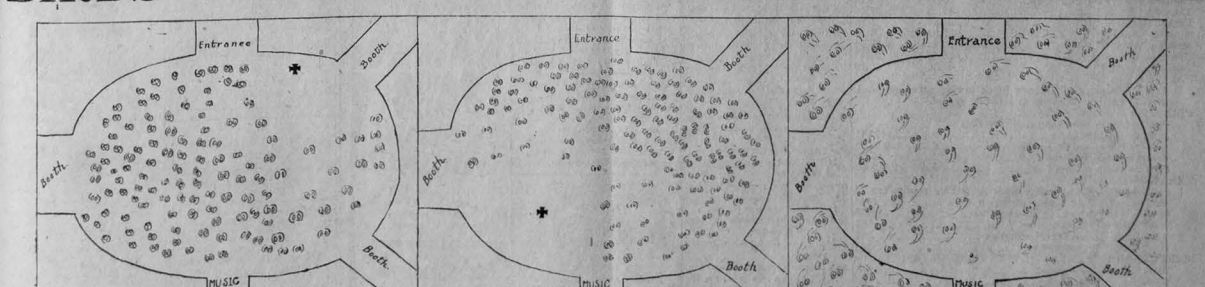

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Mystery Shrouds Action of Two Aggie Students

Found in Dark Lane With Car Sank in Mud—Aggie Students Are Rescuers

Mystery shrouds the circumstances attending the recent hazardous experiences of two prominent Aggie students, Miss Clover Johnson, president of the A. W. S. and Allen Greenhaugh, victim of the plane.

While mounting south of town a number of evenings ago, the occupants of a large car had their attention called to a halting sign emerging from a lane onto the main highway. Miffed or perhaps they were about to increase speed, when the figure forcing into the middle of the road and waving frantic signals for them to stop. He was finally recognized by the students as Mr. Greenhaugh.

He seemed taken back when he recognized the occupants of the car, and indicated for us to drive on even though he had made such efforts to stop us. He would get another car, he said. He finally however, led us around a bend of the lane leading from the main road, and there we saw his sedan, sunk to the hub in mud, absolutely immovable by its own power.

According to the rescuers, Miss Johnson was unfortunately seated in the sedan, and remained as fully delighted with the personal of the remaining crew as was Mr. Greenhaugh.

The rescuers declared themselves delighted to assist; and with much effort the car was dragged out by the bigger machine and established on firm paving. As soon as this was effected, however, Mr. Greenhaugh and Miss Johnson promptly drove toward Logan and up to the present reside absolutely to give details of their predicament.

Several circumstances are still puzzling the good samaritans. The mud was not deep enough to sink a car in progress, they declare and believe that it must have been standing still for a long time before it sank so deeply, namely they cannot understand its presence there in the first place, since the lane plainly led only to a farmer's sheep corral. But as the principle in the case rests upon to speak, the students are fair to remain an unsolved mystery.
