TRUSTEES HOLD MEETING MONDAY

Consideration of Budget Principal Matter of Business; Appointments Made

The Board of Trustees of the college, held its regular monthly meeting at the college Monday afternoon. Principal matter of business was the consideration of the budget for the next biennium which includes estimates on the cost of operation of the division of interior instruction, of the Experiment Station, the Extension division, the Branch Agricultural college and the State Power plant.

Upon the recommendation of President Elmer G. Peterson or the institution, the board reported the budget to its committee on education and finance, comprised of the following members: Hamilton Gardner, R. L. Judd and E. O. Howard of Salt Lake City and L. M. Howell of Logan, with the following members associated: A. P. Biglow of Ogden and John D. Peters of Brigham City. This committee will analyze the budget carefully and then report their recommendations to the entire board.

The board approved the report of Dr. W. L. Wanless, dean of the school of commerce and business administration, to act as a member of the advisory economic committee of the American Farm Bureau Federation. Dr. Wanless goes at the expense of the State Farm Bureau.

Mrs. Eva Page Wanless and Mrs. Ruth Moschell both were appointed instructors in English to teach the classes made necessary by the large registration at the institution. D. K. Parsonson was appointed reader in the Correspondence-study Department.

and the perpetuity of this nation lies with you, and no nation will survive without having faith in a living God.
The board president also asked the students "are you greater lovers of pleasure than of God? If he is, we are on the road which leads to death and utter disappointment. I finally believe that man is master of his own fortune and that he reaps what he sows. If we do not answer the trumpet call of the Lord, we will be the first of the lost. We will travel that road which leads to disappointment and sometimes death. There is no better way of judging the future than by looking at the past." He pointed out the consequences of the disobedience to the trumpet call by the people in olden times when they did not come back to the road of God.
