Runs Course of 2.8 Miles. In 13:40. Ransem and Best Took Second and Third

Melvin Burke, track athlete, runs from the Silver School his best in the first fall cross-country run, and won the event a distance of two and eight-tenths miles on a five-mile and forty seconds. Burke was connected with the race, but 22ndousand and 13:40 finished second and third respectively. All three were close as they circled the track on Adams field for the final stretch, but Burke sprinted away from his competitors and consequently received the gold medal. Hansen will get a silver medal and Best a bronze medal. These three men will again struggle to the 2.8-mile track, Burke expected by gaining strong in the mile run, in which race he led the national school record at Chicago last spring.
