## Civil Service Com. Announce Competitive Examination

Receipt of Applications to Close November 17; Duties of Each Given in Detail.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces the following competitive examinations:  
Position Forester, \$3,280.  
Associate Forester, \$3,000.  
Assistant Forester, \$2,440.  
Positions of applications for these positions will close November 17. The examinations are to be given in the Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture, at the various stations shown above. After the promotional period of six months required by the civil service act and successful completion, it may be made without change in assignment up to \$3,000 a year for senior forester, up to \$2,500 a year for associate forester, and up to \$2,000 a year for assistant forester. Promotion from grade to grade may be made in accordance with the civil service act.

The duties of senior forester are to plan, organize, and conduct major operations in the management, preservation, and valuation of timberlands as related to taxation, and in other phases of forest economics. The duties of associate forester are to carry out individually or with a small number of associates or assistants, under general supervision or with latitude for the exercise of independent judgment, specific investigations in the management, preservation, and valuation of timberlands as related to taxation, and in other phases of forest economics.

The duties of assistant forester are to perform, under immediate or general supervision, individually or with a small number of associates or assistants, investigations in the management, preservation, and valuation of timberlands as related to taxation, and in other phases of forest economics.

Competitors will not be required to register for examination at any place, but will be rated on their education and experience, and on oral examinations to be held with the application.

Full information and application blanks may be obtained from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or the secretary of the office of civil service examinations at the post office or customs house in any city.
