Brossard, Aggie graduate and former professor at this institution, has familiarized himself with the details of his new position as a member of the United States Tariff Commission to which he was appointed by President Coolidge last June. The appointment of Dr. Brossard following closely behind that of Secretary Jardine makes the second Aggie graduate to be holding high position in the national government.

It is looked upon as a distinct honor to the former Aggie pro- fessor's keen analytical mind, his broad understanding of the American tariff system, and its relation to Agriculture.

It is, however, nothing more than a desire for the spirit of stick- to-itiveness that has always charac- terized Commissioner Brossard from the time he attended the A. C. and won numerous titles in athletics to the present day. **R. M. F. A. Conference  
Regulates Raiding and  
Athletic Holidays.**

Year Held in S. L. City.**

At the last annual meeting of the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference, later, school vacation and athletic holidays were considered. The need of regulation on these matters was very necessary because of the serious incident that occurred during the raiding last year between the College and the University of Utah. The following was adopted by the conference and later unanimously adopted by our own faculty:

"That in case students from one conference institution be found guilty of raiding the campus of another conference institution all scheduled games of the offending institution will be cancelled for at least one year."

They also went on record as disapproving athletic holidays.

The Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference is made up of representatives from all the schools in the West. Professor R. M. F. A. West who is our representative informs us that this year for the first time in the history of the conference the meeting will be held in Utah, Salt Lake City being the place selected.
