## LOWLY ALARM CLOCK HAS FOUR FOLD USE

Clock Turns On Light And Electric Sire, Heats Room And Closes Windows—Awake Sleep On

Two U. A. C. students, on the look out for any convenience to make early morning classes easier, have invented a common alarm clock as a means of closing the window, heating the room, lighting the electric stove and turning on the electric light. The device is known as the "Lowly Alarm Clock." This, the two boys agree, is a very easily accomplished and it is a "first" story as it may sound. A further explanation shows that only the most elementary laws of physics and electricity are applied in the invention.

A small board platform is hooked on the wall over the bed. The clock is placed on the platform which has back against the wall. The alarm key on the back of the clock is inserted in an ordinary plug. The board is wrapped a wide rubber band. The band runs along the platform and protrudes over the side about a third of an inch, here it is attached to a wire with a small weight at the end. This weighted wire has a spring attached to it, which rises diagonally from the window curtain, which it will explain later, to the switch board above the platform.

The center, in fact, is the electric board, which is the most important part in the present situation. This switch in first opened and on it is placed one end of a common elastic band, while the other end of the band is attached to the board. The diagonal spring is then attached to the elastic band. The other end of this diagonal spring is connected to the switch board.

When the alarm clock is set, a weighted spring attached to the top of an old fashioned window. When the window is raised the weight is raised up. The weight is tied another wire which passes through a hole in the wall and is fastened to the diagonal spring.
