**State Engineer Lectures
At A. A. E. Meeting Fri-**

State Engineer Lloyd Harrison was
the speaker at a lunch and lecture
given by the College chapter of the
A. A. E. last Friday night at the
Commercial Club rooms. The subject,
which he dealt upon was "Water
Rights in the State of Utah."

He began by outlining the present
water rights law. "In 1915 the state
legislature passed the water right
law which is now in force," the
speaker said. "It crystallizes the ap-
propriation of the law since the com-
ing of the pioneers."

"The law is so constructed to take
care of adjudication, distribution,
and beneficial use of water for irriga-
tion purposes. The administration of
water is provided by law. Sections 1 to
19 are devoted to the distribution of
water. Sections 20 to 40 deal with the
classification of rights, and sections
41 to 61 deal with the appropriation of
water."

"A person, in order to apply for
water, must be a citizen. He must
own the land on which the water is
used, and the source of water must
be natural. The water must be used
for irrigation purposes. The water
