MAJORITY OF FACULTY SAY 80 IS GOOD GRADE

What do you consider a good grade in your courses? A good grade at the University ranges from 75 to 90 depending upon the instructor, according to answers to the faculty questionnaire sent out by the Sigma and Gold. The majority of the "good" grade stands slightly higher than 80.

Forty per cent of the faculty members who answered the question set their good grade at 80, 20 per cent at 85, and 40 per cent at 90. Only one instructor deemed 75 a good grade. "Anything above 80 is a satisfactory grade," and one faculty member, "providing that the student has done his best."

Are The Feet of Modern Coeds Growing Larger?

BERLIN, March 17.—A controversy about the feet of modern women and the heels of a century ago has been started by an exhibition here of the shoe styles of 1825. Many of the shoes of celebrated actresses and beauties of one hundred and even fifty years ago are so small that the women of today refuse to believe they were really worn by normal persons. PICK UP GENTLE RATS FOR NUTRITION CLASS

Did you ever see a girl pick up a rat by its tail? Some persons would call her exceedingly brave, for most girls are afraid to step on a rat, let alone pick it up. But little feminine sagacity at the sight of such an animal.

Girls are picking up rats, feeding them and then feeding them to the rats. This is the case with the rats of the body. Calcium forms the basis of the bone tissue in the body and regulates other body processes. Without this mineral strong bones and teeth are impossible.

All three rats are given a regular diet consisting of potatoes, meat, and butter. One rat has his regular diet plus sugar, another plus calcium, and the other plus milk. The rats that receive the diet for calcium and as a result the rat given that food has the strongest bones.

This is one of the five experiments that the nutrition class will put on for the all-school exposition. Another experiment will show what the grading boy needs by comparing him with an eagle as to the amount of food needed for good running condition.

One exhibit will give a typical day's diet for the person under weight. Here is the chance for everyone to see what is best to eat and to be identified in either of the above divisions.

CUTS ARE INCREASED AMONG UPPER CLASSES AT MONTANA STATE

Since the advent of the new number of cuts for upperclassmen the number of students taking enough cuts to have credit deferring has nearly doubled.

During the fall quarter 65 upperclassmen who were not on probation took enough cuts to have credits deferred, or would have had if the new ruling had not been in effect. Besides this 43 students, composed of upperclassmen on probation and freshmen and sophomores, had credit deferrals. This makes 108 students taking more than 12 cuts as compared to the 42 of the fall quarter in 1922 when the new rule was not in force.

The 65 upperclassmen averaged eighteen and a half cuts for the fall quarter.

Nielson Chosen To Compete In Nat. Contest

Preston M. Nielson will represent the College oratory in the Pacific region of the National Oratorical Contest as a result of the contest held last Friday. Mr. Nielson should prove a capable representative, since he holds all three college medals for oratory, the Cato medal, the Hendricks medal, and the S. A. R. medal, and is also the only four year debating man now in attendance at the college.

The contest is sponsored and conducted by the Better America Federation of California, as a contribution toward better and more intelligent citizenship. The orators must be original, must not repeat more than ten minutes for delivery and must be on the Constitution or the relationship thereof of Washington, Hamilton, Jefferson, Madison, Webster or Lincoln. Any non-graduate student of undergraduate rank in any college or higher learning in this country is eligible to compete for the cash awards ranging from \$100 to \$2,000.

The contest is under the sponsorship of Stanley B. Hesk, president of Delta Sigma Psi (National Public Speaking Society) at Portland, Ore. and Westfall, president of Phi Kappa Delta, a similar thought independent public speaking society of the United States. It also has the support of college officials generally.

The contest is divided into seven divisions according to geographical unity and college enrollments. There are, roughly, 400 colleges, students at these seven regions. Clearing centers for these seven regions are as follows: New York, New York, Washington, Nashville, Chicago, St. Louis and San Francisco.

The winner in each of the seven divisions will go to Los Angeles, to compete on June 5 for the even grand prize. This automatically guarantees the national champion a prize ranging from \$200 to \$2,000. In order to narrow down the contestants in each region, the initial selections will be based upon the orations in written form.

The intention to regard it as a fundamental requirement of the contest that the orators must be of good character and of high moral interest in and respect for the Constitution of the United States. The contestants must be the means of turning college thought and enthusiasm toward the great and unending business of government and particularly toward that form of constitutional government under which America has risen to power among the nations of the earth.

The judges for the local contest Rex Hirsch and Maria Tharner were the other contestants.

Utah Schools Win Health Tournament

Utah schools have again won honors in the national health tournament by capturing twenty of the prizes awarded annually for the best health work in the public schools. This makes three years in succession that Utah has come off victorious in this health contest which is engaged in by more than six million school children in the United States.

The health tournament is conducted by the National Tuberculosis Association and consists of training in good health habits. It is based on the old pedagogical rule "learn by doing," and through the cooperation of parents, the children are taught to perform their daily health chores and as a result, good health habits are formed during that period of life when they are so necessary.

James W. Wall, executive secretary of the Utah Public Health Association, received word from New York that Utah had again won the honors and that the prizes would be forwarded to the winning schools immediately.

State Champions Will Try For Inter-Mountain Championship Thursday, Friday and Sat.
