The catalog for the second annual session of the Utah Agricultural College Summer School is off the press and ready for distribution according to an announcement made recently by Dr. J. H. Lillard, director of the summer school.

In the annual class track and field meet held Saturday last, on Adams Field, the veteran Hy Mortensen was easily high point man of the meet with 21 points to lead credit coming to virtue of winning the 100 yard dash, two hurdles race and second place in both the 400 yard dash and javelin. By winning the above Mortensen won the 220 yard dash by Charles of the Cardozo Jewelry Company. This is his third successive year to win this honor and up to a record that is in all previous years.

Following Mortensen, came the tie for second place and for the silver Cardozo medal was Burke, winning the half mile and 440 yard dash and Geddes winning the 220 yard dash and quarter mile. These three men won first place with 21 points followed by the Sophs who had 11 points, then the Frosh with 21 points. The Juniors came last with but 3 points.

In Frosh competition the P. Zeta team won 21 points followed by the Epiphany who had 27 points. Following them came the Phi Kappa, Omega Tau, Sigma Alpha, Delta Nu and Phi Beta Rho.

Taking into consideration this time of the year there were some very good marks made especially by Mortensen in the low hurdles, Burke in the mile, knot in the discus, Harrell in the shot, Smith and Flint in the 220 yard dash and Baker and Lant in the high jump.
