INCREASE OF 140 STUDENTS OVER LAST YEAR'S REGISTRATION IS NOTED

More students completed registration on the first day of the winter quarter at the Utah Agricultural College than on any other single day in the history of the school. According to the report issued by W. H. Bell, assistant registrar, the college has a record of 1,400 students, an increase of 140 over the year's enrollment. The registration on that day and many more were expected to complete the process during the week. One hundred and forty more students completed registration on the first day of the winter quarter this year compared with 100 on the same day last year. The gain in new students was approximately the same as last year.

The cumulative total of registration shows that approximately twelve hundred students have registered since the college was first registering and it is highly probable that a similar number of registered students will be reached this year, even including those who have been dropped from the college for various reasons.

According to Dr. F. L. West, Dean of the faculty, registration will continue throughout the winter quarter. It is expected that the number of new students to be registered for the Christmas holidays, though the numbers of those who will be dropped will be cut somewhat.

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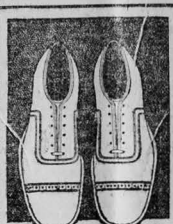

After the opening tilt the Phi Kappas defeated the freshmen 12-3, Watkins from the Oregons 12-10, and the Taus by a 20-16 score and Rippon's team lost to the Delta Nu in a fast game by the score of 17-17. In the concluding match the Epsilons won over the Sigma Chi's by a 24-18 score.

In the second day's program winners played winners and losers played losers which opened up the first one-sided victory for the Phi Kappas over the Oregons by a 26-6 score. The Delta Nus again came out victorious by winning from the Epsilons by a 20-13 count.

In the consolation tourney the Sigma Chi's won from the Freshmen five by the score of 17-16. The Phi Kappas defeated the team best Rippon's quint by a 17-16 score.

Only two games were played yesterday. The Omega Taus lost to Watkins by a 24-18 score and the Delta Nu's lost to what seemed to be the best basketball that has been played on the Aggie floor since 1929.

Tomorrow will see the final match which will be between the Kappas and the Oregons. This was no doubt a thrilling affair as both teams are out for the championship and are both equally strong.

The winner of the Intra-mural series will receive a pennant upon which will be listed the eight leading players of the championship.
