The primary purpose in recognizing scholarship and the various forms of activity is to stimulate participation in them. The writer does not propose an expensive and elaborate award, but one that is neat and dignified in its appearance. Surely a more attractive award would provide greater inducement for competition in this phase of activity. If nothing else it would lead our friends of the College to believe that scholarship is just as important as athletics—almost.
