cautions against fire hazard. With this money it will be possible to place these systems in reasonably good shape and the possibility of fire at the institution due to any possible defects in the lighting system will be removed. A further appropriation of \$10,000 was made to complete the veterinary clinic building and to build a beef cattle barn.

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
