POLITICS

The day for nominations of Student Body officers for the year 1929-30 is at hand. Today in student assembly candidates will be officially placed before the Student Body for consideration; they will remain in the field of candidates for one week, until next Friday, April 19. At that time every name of our student government will appear at the polls to cast his ballot. The question is, are you giving the prospective office holders for next year serious consideration?

It is the privilege and duty of every member of the Associated Students of the Utah State Agricultural College to have a hand in the selection of officers of the student organization. The most capable persons to direct the affairs of our student government cannot be chosen thoughtlessly. It is a problem which should command the serious attention of every Aggie. Student Life would suggest that students select candidates for the respective offices who are qualified; men and women who will serve the interests of the Student Body conscientiously.

Between nominations and elections, when the campaigning is at its height, while many new names are being tested, the old ones retired, there is a possibility that some factions in the Student Body will resort to methods which are unfair, unethical, and which detract from "clean politics." It is difficult to differentiate, in many cases, between what is legitimate and what is illegitimate in political activity, but observers, in any case, should be able to recognize tendencies which approach the extreme. It is to be hoped, for the benefit of our Student Body, that Utah Aggies will have sufficient interest and courage to oppose any practices that savor of underhanded political endeavor.

If the ultimate purpose of the election is to be accomplished, the interests of individuals and factions must be subordinated to those of the Student Body at large.

BULLETIN BOARD DISFIGUREMENT

A close observer of the bulletin boards on either side of the chapel doors will notice that occasionally the announcements posted there have been rearranged or otherwise disfigured so that their meaning is illogical, and they resemble work that might be the product of kindergarten students.

These disfiguring alterations must be accredited to some ambitious, though thoughtless person who feels disposed to sacrifice the dignity of the bulletin boards for the sake of producing a pun. In the words of Holmes, "People that make puns are like wanton boys that put coppers on the railroad track. They amuse themselves and other children but their little trick may upset a freight train of conversation for the sake of a barefaced witicism." Certainly the slight humor caused by disfigurement of the bulletin boards does not merit the confusion which it causes students, to say nothing of the lack of dignity that it brings to the College. Tampering with the bulletin boards should not be included in the realm of college activity.

be appointed in April of the year preceding the one in which they are to act. All assistant managers, except Assistant Manager of Football, shall be appointed within one month after the beginning of the school year in which they are to act. The Assistant Manager of Football shall be appointed in April preceding the year in which he is to act.

Section 4. Clause 12. It shall be the duty of all athletic managers; namely, football, basketball and swimming, track and wrestling, baseball and tennis, etc., to do such work under the Coach, Director of Athletics, and Athletic Council as will make for the success of the sport managed. He shall render an account to the Athletic Council for all moneys received and disbursed.

The following clauses are being revised due to a change in the Rocky Mountain Conference rules.

BY LAWS

Change the block "A" to Old English "A" in Section 2, clauses 1, 2 and 3 (track); Section 3, clauses 1, 2, and 3 (basketball); Section 4, clauses 1, 2 and 3 (baseball); Section 5, clauses 1, 2 and 3 (wrestling); Section 7, clauses 1, 2 and 3 (swimming); and Section 8, clause 1 (Cross Country).

Section 5. (Pertaining to tennis awards).

Clause 1. The first year's award shall be a blue sweater with a 5-inch Old English "A" in the left side.

Clause 2. The second year's award shall be a blue and white striped sweater with a 5-inch Old English "A" and white trimmings.

Clause 3. The third year's award shall be a white sweater coat with a 5-inch Old English "A" on the left side. Three blue service stripes three-fourths inch wide.

shall be woven in the left sleeve.

Section 10. Clause 1. Take out the words "and captain."

Section 13. Clause 1. No "A" shall be awarded for basketball unless a man has played in at least 15 per cent of the inter-collegiate games played during the season.

Section 16. Clause 1. No "A" shall be awarded for Tennis unless a man has played in at least 25 per cent of the intercollegiate meets.

Section 17. Clause 1. No "A" shall be awarded for wrestling unless the man has wrestled in 25 per cent of the intercollegiate meets, and has obtained at least one full or two draws or two decisions provided more than one meet is held. If only one meet is held the man must gain at least a draw or a decision.

Block "A" Limited. There was a great deal of discussion regarding the clause which calls for the changing of the block "A" to an Old English "A" in all sports with the exception of football, however it was necessary because of the Conference ruling. This was necessary to make football more exclusive than ever while it will seemingly lessen the importance of basketball and track. At the same time, though, it will increase the importance of swimming and wrestling, thus placing all sports with the exception of football, in one class.

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

Phi Kappa Iota Fraternity Wins Spring Track Meet

Levi Myers Rumps Away With Individual Honors of The Day

The silver loving cup awarded to the fraternity garnering the highest number of points each year in the interclass track and field meet was won by the Phi Kappa Iota fraternity last week. The Phi Kappas succeeded in registering 31 counters while the Delta Kappa Alpha representatives came second with a total of 25 points. Last year the silver trophy was won by the Sigma Chi fraternity.

Individual honors of the two day program went to none other than Levi Myers, a sophomore. Myers covered himself with glory by rumping away with first places in the 100, 220, 440, and 880 yard dashes for a total of twenty points and consequently the Cardon medal of gold for individual honors. Glen Worthington, high point man for the two previous seasons, came second for individual performance with a total of fifteen points. Zeus won first place in the 220 yard high hurdles, second in the 120 yard high hurdles, tied for second in the 100 yard dash, placed third in the discus throw, and second in the 220 yard dash. The surprise of the meet came when young Keith Stanger, a sophomore, bested Worthington in the high hurdle race. 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
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Utah Aggie Group Relinquish Crown To Utah
