Track Meet Friday — Interest at
Peak—Only College Track Meet
in Logan This Year.

This state is all set, and everything is in readiness for the only collegiate track meet in Logan this year. The eyes of all the sports writers of northern Utah are turned to this contest and have been for some time. However, many other college track meets are being held in various parts of the state.

Coach Romney's athletes have been training diligently the past few weeks in preparation for this dual meet, and a long hours and hard work spent anything the Aggies will offer plenty of competition. According to the latest dope posters conversation the Utes and Aggies should battle on even terms and a few unexpected performances may decide the meet.

Probably the biggest attraction of the day will be the high hurdle race between Glen Worthington and Byron Grant of Utah. The mighty "Zeus" the peerless athlete of the Rocky Mountains has reigned supreme in this race for the last three years in state competition and now Grant, coming hurdling over the horizon with enough skill and ability to mark him as one of the outstanding hurdlers of the conference. Only last Saturday the Utah star negotiated the elevated obstacles in the record time of 15.4 seconds, and when these two stars clash tomorrow the scorers may be well chalk up a new record.

Another race drawing considerable attention is the 440 yd. dash featuring Levi Meyers, the Aggies iron man and Nathan Long, the fastest scholar of the Utah campus. These two exceptional performers are both capable of turning this race in at least 50 flat and possibly 49 and a fraction.

In the sprint race the Aggies are depending on Stewart, Gillespie and Barnes, this trio of speed addicts should make it interesting for the best Utah can offer.

In the field events the points will perhaps be equally divided as Coach of Hawley, the Aggies and Cox at Utah has left both squads without any phenomenon might heavier. 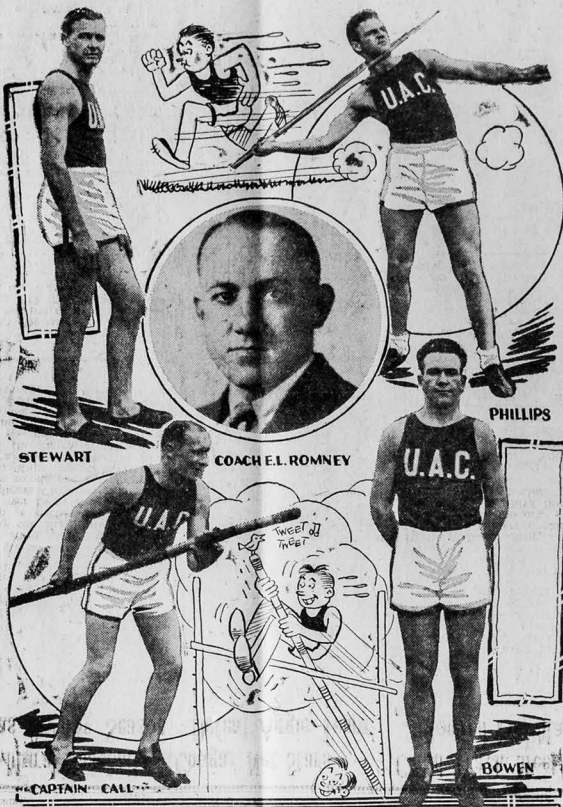

B. Y. U. netmen under Coach "Buck" Dixon clinched the state tennis championship when they overcame the attack of the Utah Aggie five last Monday at Provo. Winning the first four matches and leaving the fifth incomplete, the Cougars had a great day. This victory gives the B. Y. U. tennis stars their second consecutive championship. Although the final outcome was decisive enough every match was close and some high class stroking was flashed.

Merrill's Aggie colors lacked the final punch to put over victory. The first doubles tilt went to the Provo pair of Holt and Gilchrist when Saxer and Cannon seemed unable to cope with the placements of Holt and the lob of Gilchrist, the score being 6-2, 6-4, 6-4.

In the most exciting match of the afternoon the "V" duo of Dixon and Brinley finally conquered Cowley and Linebaugh, the Aggies, Dixon and Cowley, rival Aces, featured this match with powerful drives and chops but the underdogs, Brinley and Linebaugh, came in for a large share of the honors. This score stood 4-6, 7-5, 6-3, 17-15 for the Cougar pair.

In the lone singles encounter Lewis Skunk won a hard-fought tilt from Jack Christensen, Logan player. Munk displayed a vicious forehand drive to outsize his rival in four sets. The scores were 6-3, 4-6, 9-7, 6-2.

Paul Holt came back strong in his doubles match to outsize his opponent in a three set. Holt's superior steadiness won him the victory to the tune of 6-3, 9-11, 6-3.
