In the annual intercollegiate track and field meet held Saturday, May 18, in the University of Utah stadium, the Utes placed first with 68 1-2 points, the Brigham Young University placed second with 34 1-4 points, and the Utah Aggies came third with 30 1-4 points.

Four intercollegiate track records were broken and one was tied. Mark Reeve, B. Y. U. weight man, swung the hammer 144.65 feet to better his record of three weeks ago by over five feet. Captain Owen Jones of the B. Y. U. made the 100-yard dash in the exceptionally fast time of 9.4 seconds which ties the record made four years ago by Haines of B. Y. U. Mack squires of Utah who only placed third in the mile run at the track meet held in Logan a week ago, made it in 4 minutes and 27 seconds, one second faster than Alex Hoggan's record-breaking race of six years ago. Hoggan was a Utah man. The two other record-breaking feats were the broad jump of 25 feet 5 inches made by Rowe, and the discus throw of 139 feet 9 inches by Corbett, both bettering the record of Bill Cox of Utah by three inches.

Owen Rowe of B. Y. U. was high point man of the meet. On the final two laps of the mile relay brilliant sprinting by Geddes and Myers gave the Utah Aggies a victory over Utah, B. Y. U. took third place.
