

Aggies Upset Dope Bucket Last Saturday Outplaying Montana in all Departments

Aggies Trim Montana 30-0 Montana Held Scoreless First Time in Three Years—Aggies Beat Great Ground Gainers

By virtue of a denture 9 to 0 victory over the Montana State Bobcats last Saturday, the big blue team upset somewhat of a dope bucket and at the same time lined up to the expectations of many of their supporters. In addition, the Romney charges held their heavier loss scores for the first time in three years.

Both teams had numerous chances to score but a determined defense by the other snuffing a scoring hope. On two occasions the great defensive work of co-captain Ed Jensen, Aggie lineman, threw certain Bobcat scores on the wrong track.

Two Aggie advances were stopped within the Bobcats 20 yard line by penalties in the first period. The feature of this period was the excellent blocking of Kierman, Bobcat back, against a strong wind.

The second period saw the Montana first great chance to score. A punn of Call for Cal was carried out of bounds on the Farmers 30 yard line. Two successive first downs were then registered by the heavy line plunging of the Montana backfield. At this crucial moment Jensen threw DeFrate for a five yard loss.

A series of well executed passes in this period carried the Montana team deep into Aggie territory but their efforts were again warded off by the great work of Captain Jensen. After gaining possession of the ball the big blue team carried it back into enemy territory largely due to the offensive work of Call and Kierman. Montana line and the ball changed hands. On the first play Call and Kierman tackled Jensen and Wylie, Montana back, fell on the ball over the line counting a safety for the Aggies. Call made a beautiful return of

the following kick, almost getting away for a touchdown. Ed Jensen, Aggie end, intercepted the Montana pass after his team had lost the ball on the Farmers 30 yard line. The Aggie defense, led by Gillette and Remund carried the ball to the goal line as the quarter ended. The touchdown and conversion coming immediately after the fourth quarter opened this ended the scoring but the Farmers threatened many times in the last period.

The Aggies registered fifteen first downs and 283 yards from scrimmage against the Bobcats, while their opponents gained 50 yards and claimed six first downs. The Montana backfield, led by DeFrate, Gillette, and Remund, carried the ball for the Aggies, competing three times for the Aggie's possession in many other respects was not up to its passing form.

Captain Jensen was the big man for the Aggies. With Vanderhook and Gardner teaming in for a share of the
