## Jensen Catches Pass That Wins

### Blue and White Outplay Foes—Weaken in Final Quarter—Gillespie Injured

Before a capacity homecoming crowd that jammed the stands as well as the bleachers and every available space, the University of Wyoming football eleven was again pummeled into submission by a crippled but fighting Utah Aggie team. The score was 12 to 0 and the game was just about that close.

Co-Captain Ed Jensen of the Farmers put over what proved to be the winning score, in the third period, when he juggled through the Cowboy line and intercepted a short pass. He juggled the ball for a while and finally gained possession of it after which he raced sixty yards for a touchdown.

The first Aggie score came in the first quarter, after an exchange of punts. The Aggies took the ball on the Cowboy 40 yard line. On the first play, Dan Gillespie, the hard hitting Aggie fullback, smashed through the center of the line and on four successive plays plowed through the Cowboy line. Remond missed the goal, as he was on the second touchdown.

**Cowboys Threaten**

The desperate hard-fighting Wyoming team was, twice, within inches of close coming home when the hurt that produces points, in the first half, they were not allowed after making a first down on the Aggie 40 yard line. Ed Jensen held four times and the ball went over to the Aggies on the 40 yard line. Joe Ford, Aggie quarter broke up the second coming home when he intercepted a Wyoming pass and returned it to midfield. Had he not done up for his interference he probably would have scored a touchdown. But he was tackled from behind. Reverse plays and lateral passes were largely responsible for the Wyoming gains.

At the beginning of the second half, the Farmers made a determined drive for touchdown which was stopped on the Cowboys 15 yard line as the Aggies piled it up. It was soon after that that Jensen made his sensational play and the Aggies took a twelve point lead. The Cowboys then launched an attack which carried them only two touchdowns. Thompson of Wyoming, after kicking the kickoff to the Aggie 40 yard mark. Several short reverse plays and a pass put Jensen on the Aggie 10 yard line and from there he was tackled by Thompson and on a lateral pass for a touchdown.

**Statistics Give Aggies Big Edge**

Co-Captain Bergeson, who substituted for Vanderhoff played a great defensive game on the line. Co-captain Jensen also played a wonderful game, especially in the second half. Gillespie, who was injured early in the game, was out for the rest of the game.

The whole Cowboy backfield functioned very well on the offense as well as the defense. Captain Stewart was stood out in the line.

The Aggies completed four passes for a total of 40 yards. The Aggie passes were intercepted and each one at times when they had pushed the ball into the territory. Wyoming completed four passes for 31 yards. The Aggies gained 269 yards in the line; Call, Gillespie and Maughan who substituted for Gillespie were largely responsible for this yardage. Wyoming gained 17 yards through the line, 83 of them coming in the first quarter.
