PITTSBURGH U. MEN COACH SIGNS AS COLLEGE BASKETBALL COACH

AGGIES RALLY IN LAST FEW MINUTES TO WIN CLOSE CONTEST

Jones to Take Post Filled by Rockne, Warner, and Zupke in Past Years—Dr. Carlson to Coach Hoop Sport

Howard Jones, now completing his fifth year as head football coach at the University of Southern California, and Dr. H. C. Carlson, nationally famous basketball coach at the Pittsburgh University, will be the principal figures at the fourth U. S. A. C. summer coaching school which starts June 9 and ends June 13. Both sports will be given in one week, which should be more agreeable to attending coaches according to Coach E. L. Romney who will again be in charge of the school.

Jones has coached football squads of Yale, Syracuse, Ohio State, Iowa, and is now at U. S. C. He is the fourth of a quartet that is called probably the greatest quartet of coaches in the country. Preceding Jones football coaches of the school are Knute Rockne, coach at Notre Dame, Pop Warner, Stanford U. coach and Bob Zupke, the famous Illinois coach. The system used by Jones is somewhat different on the offense as that offered by the other three. Many of his former pupils are already contributing the system into this part of the country.

Since Howard Jones has taken the helm of Trojan football, so the systems of play in this section of the country and has probably taken over a five year period. In the past five years his teams have not only seven games, four of which have won point totals. The 19-7 victory scored over the Trojans by California this year was the largest margin any team has ever held over U.S.C. since Jones made his entry.

AGGIES MEET COAST QUINT
Four Games Scheduled—Meet U. S. C. 27-28

In the latter part the visitors defense crumbled, and the Aggies scored 26 points extended throughout the remainder of the contest.

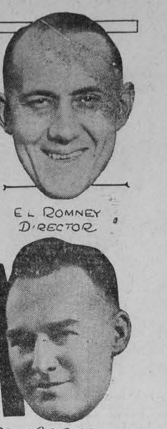
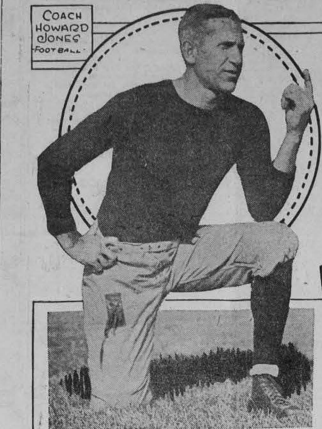
