Training Camp Opens September 3 for Aspirants of Big Blue Team

NINE HARD TILTS  
Coach Enlists Capable Corps of Assistant Trainers to Return

Faced with what is undoubtedly the toughest grid schedule the Utah Aggies have ever been dealt, Coach Dick Romney is taking no time in preparation. He has just issued a call to all team players in which he emphasizes the schedule, which is not only the most difficult but the best and most interesting one yet to come to the Farmers, September 3 will be the opening day of the training camp which will be held on the campus. Boys and coaches will be required to play at a minimum cost.

At least nine, possibly ten hard games will be played by the Utah Aggie gridlers next season and from September 25 until Thanksgiving the Aggie eleven will be busy every Saturday. With the exception of the one immediately preceding Thanksgiving, all conference and one non-conference games will be played during this period. The possible tenth contest is with the University of Utah, which will be played immediately after the close of the season. The decision has yet been made concerning this trip.

Coach Romney will have a capable group of assistants with him this season. George Nelson, long established as one of the best coaches in the state, will continue as trainer. Sterling Adams, a freshman coach, will return this year. Two other assistants will also be experienced. They are Armando Jeffs and Coach Jeffs. Coach Jeffs, at Prentiss high school and at the University of Utah for a number of years, will complete certain courses prior to his return to the profession school next year. Reading was mandatory in the school of the next year. Jeffs is a close student of the game and should be a great help to Romney. Jeffs will probably do much of his work with the freshmen and sophomores, which appear to be tough football teams.
