## Mama's Delights Aggie Audience

Utah State theater-goers who see "Remember Mama" this week will be delighted with the atmosphere, simplicity and charm of the country transplanted to the Main auditorium.

The play, which is based on "Mama's Delights" book "Mama's Delights," will continue to be Friday and Saturday with main time at 8:15 p. m. each night.

A play in two acts, "Mama's Delights" is the plot to sustain it, so it must be heavily on interpretation, dialogue, and the human qualities of the characters themselves. Under the direction of George Tanner, these characters become a typical American family that has migrated to San Francisco at the turn of the century.

Foreign-Twist

Mama, with her soft Norwegian accent, is delightfully played by Barbara Gaddie as a lovable and endearing character who keeps her welfare of her family foremost in her mind. Some of the dialogue between Mama and members of the family becomes priceless with the foreign twist given to the words.

Uncle Chris, Cecil Welles almost steals the show, giving one of the latest characterizations seen on the Utah State stage in many years. He is always the robust "Black Norwegian" who frightens his nieces and nephews but who he has a heart.

Another character who is outstanding in the short time he is on stage is Mr. Hyde, the lawyer, as portrayed by Larry Wright. His British accent and bearing are little short of perfect.

## Dr. J. N. Symons Resigns; Whitesides Named Dean

Dr. Joseph N. Symons has resigned as dean of students, and Joe E. Whitesides, former director of athletics has been appointed as the new Dean.

Dean Symons submitted his letter of resignation to members of the Board of Trustees, who met last Saturday in the State Capitol building.

Previously, the Board had recommended that President Louis L. Madsen offer Dean Symons a position as acting head of the sociology department—a transfer which would naturally take him from the Deanship.

Symons Will Leave

Although his plans are not definite as yet, Dean Symons submitted his resignation to be effective Feb. 15. He indicated that he is leaving the campus this week.

The appointment of Dean Whitesides was effective immediately following the announcement, so Utah State has actually had two Deans this week.

John O. Roning, head football coach was named director of athletics, succeeding Dean Whitesides, who was also named graduate manager of athletics.

Isaacson Comments

Contacted by telephone in Salt Lake City Monday, Thorpe B. Isaacson, chairman of the board stated: "The board received the resignation of Dean Symons at our meeting on Saturday and the Board accepted the resignation. It was my pleasure, in behalf of the Board to extend to Dean Symons our very best wishes in any other work that he became engaged in, and I urged him always to be mindful of the great institution he has served for 17 years. In behalf of the Board I wished him the very best of everything wherever he went or whatever he did."

Continuing, Chairman Isaacson stated that it was the feeling of the Board that Joe Whitesides would be an excellent dean of students. "He likes young men and he was glad to accept this position," Isaacson stated. "He met with us personally and the (Continued on Page 5)

The Conference, sponsored by the Associated Women Students, as an aid to all students on campus, will begin Tuesday at 11 a. m., with a keynote address by Dr. Daryl Chase, former dean of students here, and now director of Branch Agricultural college at Cedar City.

This keynote address and session will come at the regular assembly hour on Thursday.

Wed., Thurs., Meetings

Then on Wednesday and Thursday, meetings will be held within the seven schools of the College. Numerous sessions are planned covering a wide variety of careers. Speakers from the intermountain area will be in attendance, and following their addresses, individual consultations will be held.

A special program listing all meetings is being printed and will be available for reference. Continued in it are the meetings, speakers, times, and places of the sessions of the seven schools, plus general information.

Careers available to students in various fields will be stressed, and aptitudes and preparations will be indicated by the speakers.

Fresh And Seniors

Freshmen or other students now deciding upon major subjects of study, or seniors contemplating graduation and "job-seeking," probably will gain much valuable information from the Career Conference. However, all students and faculty on campus are invited to attend.

There will be no general dismissal of classes for the Conference, but students may make arrangements with instructors to be excused from classes to attend special meetings.

San Francisco Theological Seminary A Cappella Choir, now on their 16th annual tour, appears annually on the Columbia radio of the Air. This will be its first Utah appearance.

Miner E. Bruner of the local Presbyterian Church has been asked to schedule a Logan appearance since he first heard the choir in 1940. The A Cappella Choir is composed entirely of students in the ministry, religious education and musical leadership. Among better-known choir numbers recognized composers, the program will include "Exultate" (Psalm 150) by Palestrina, a musical Nativity Pageant, a group of spirituals: "Poor Working Stranger" and "Babylon Fallen."

Alec Templeton, pianist and composer, will appear in Utah State's final winter quarter program set for March 9 in the Aggie house.

Templeton best describes Templeton, beloved figure in the world of music. He has starred in stage, on radio, in theater, in recordings. 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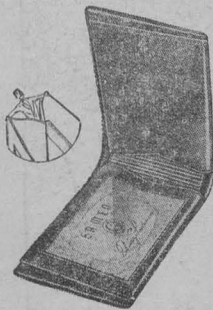

Scoring starts from 100 and works back, the team with the lowest score at the end of the game is declared the winner. The Sig Alphas were champs last year by a 87-94 score.

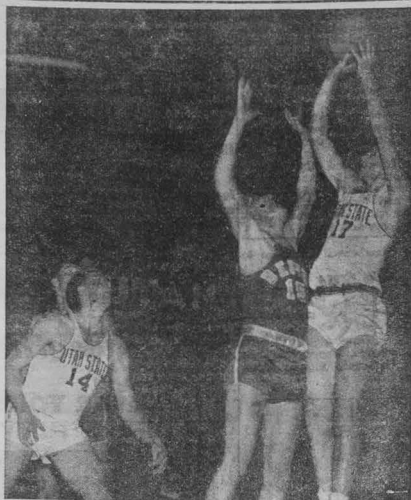
Much talent has been called upon to take part in the annual extravaganza.

## Cagers Post Wins Over Denver, Nex Mexico in Skyline Tilts

A fast moving, sharp shooting Aggie five, scorched the nets for a well earned 83 to 73 win over the Denver Pioneers last Thursday night.

It was Capt. Darrell Tucker, who led the Farmers in the scoring department as well as playing his usually fine floor game. Tucker swished 27 points through the nets, boosting his conference game average to a nifty 20.5. 21 of his 27 points were scored in the first half. Many fans were hoping that Darrell would break the conference record of 39 points, but a sloppy second half by the Aggie team made the record secure.

Coach Cec Baker's team scored 54 points the first half, but they just couldn't keep up the fast pace in the second half, scoring a mere 29 points. The Denver team hit for 34 points, gaining 5 points the second half.

Bill Hull swept the ball from the boards 22 times, boosting his previous 13.7 rebound average. Hull also clipped in 13 points for a commendable night's performance.

Bart Johnson did some fine ball handling, as well as taking his share of rebounds. Johnson scored 15 points for the second best point performance on the Aggie team.

Jack Clark and Cordell Brown, two speedy little guards, played a great ball game. Both Clark and Brown put on an individual show for the fans, stealing passes, busting rebounds and also scoring their

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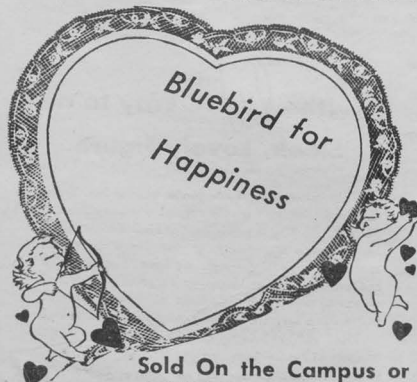
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# Utags Clash With Pokes-A&M This Weekend

## AGS MUST WIN 2 "TOUGHIES" TO HOLD LEAGUE 3RD PLACE

In this last conference action at home, the third place Utah State eagles will take on their toughest pair of opponents in the form of the Rams from Colorado A & M tonight and the front running Cowboys of Wyoming on Saturday.

If Cec Baker's lads hope to hold onto their present Skyline position they will have to win just about all of the rest of their seven loop tilts. This would mean continuing their present winning streak by tromping a dangerous Colorado Aggie team tonight.

With three impressive wins last week, Coach Baker seems to have found a good starting combination in the form of Bill Hull at center (the conference's leading rebounder and fourth scorer), Darrell Tucker (the league's leading scorer with a 20.7 point average), and Bart Johnson at forward, and steady Jack Clark and Spark-plug Cordell Brown at guards.

The Pokes will have trouble forgetting that their only conference loss last season was from the Utah State club that played inspired ball to win on their own court by a 54-45 score. A loss by the Waddies would be disastrous at this stage of the loop race as they have but five games remaining on their slate with the Cougars having six.

Darrell Tucker will have one of

his toughest scoring week-ends as A & M and especially Wyoming are noted for their defensive prowess. The Aggie captain did get 17 points against the Cowboys at Laramie in the second game of the season, but with the reputation of the league's top point getter, Coach Shelton will have plenty ready to stop Tucker.

The Cowboys have one of the lowest opponent score averages in the country and have always been noted for their ball control and tremendous rebounding strength. This season's squad is no exception as 6'7" Ron Rivers at center and 6'6" Bob Jorgensen at forward have teamed with jumpin'-jack Bob Burns to have plenty of rebound potential. Bill Hull will certainly have his work cut out for him against these Cowboys.

Tickets for tonight's game are just about gone, with but a few left for Saturday's contest.

These two combos and Tucker, who could look sensational playing with anyone, along with Coach Baker, have given the Aggies one of the best ball clubs in the Skyline Conference.

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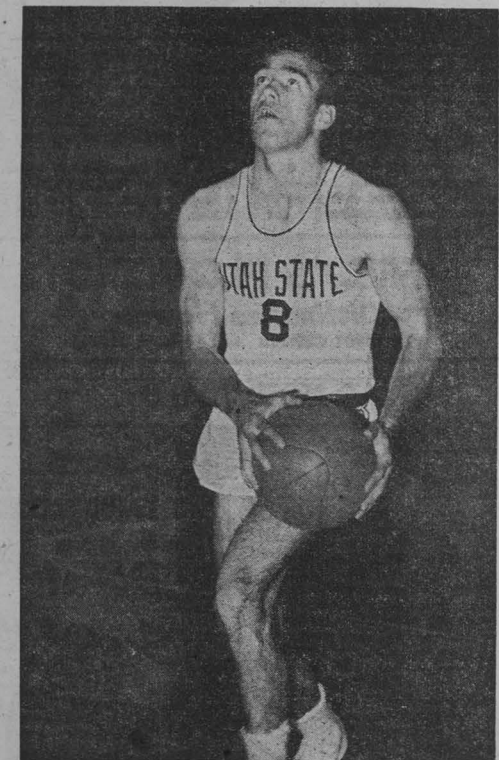
