Police today captured one of Utah's top criminals, and the arrest immediately cleared up huge fund shortages which have been reported lately at Utah State college.

Since I first started in my present position I have been striving to think of some original ideas which would no doubtless be good for saving the college lots of money and at the same time make the burden of expenses lighter for we students who are here as well as those prospective students who are planning to come to the college if they can afford it in order to avoid the draft and get an education which everyone admits will help a person through all walks of life. This is needed.

### Has Always Been

I have always been of the opinion that the best way to save money or be efficient in anything is to kill two birds with one stone—to coin a new phrase. I have observed lately the men working on the campus lawns. This is hard work. Now the biggest single lawn area is the quad. If we could reduce the amount of work needed to keep that lawn in top condition, it would save the college lots of money.



I have in mind some specific proposals which I would like to take this opportunity to pass on to you at this time.

I think they are unique inasmuch as the plan seems so workable and has such very real merits yet no one has suggested it before—the best of my knowledge.

### Problem Boils

The problem boils down to about four main phases which must each be considered. First of all we have the problem of students (and even some faculty members) walking across the grass and making paths, there-

by spoiling the appearance.

Then we have the problem of fertilizing the grass. It must also be kept cut and watered.

### Admits.

Now I admit that spreading manure on the lawn is a subtle way of keeping people from walking across it but it is not 100 percent effective since some of us don't seem to mind anyway. What we need is a fence around each quarter of the quad. This would keep nearly everyone off the grass. Then if we make the investment of a fence we could easily keep cows there which would spread fertilizer automatically and at the same time keep the grass short. The dairy building would be near and they would have easy access to the cows.

### You Can See

As you can see this one simple investment would take care of three of our four problems. It is as simple as it can be.

The only remaining question is how to water the lawns efficiently. I would suggest irrigation rather than the elaborate system of sprinkling where the water sprays in the air and most of it is lost through evaporation.

### Would Necessitate

This would, of course, necessitate surveying the quad to determine if it is level enough for proper irrigation. This can be done by the engineers. In fact, I have noticed them several times since I started to school. They had men out survey-

Professor Stewart was caught by two of his journalism students one night preceeding test week. He was crouched beneath his desk in his office, evidently guarding his final exam papers. The two students who broke into the office were unable to obtain copies of the exam, due to the unsportsmanlike conduct of Professor Stewart.

Dean Carlton Culmsee, Dean of the school of Arts and Sciences, charged Stewart with taking unfair advantage of his students and stated that the board of trustees does not condone such "under the table conduct."

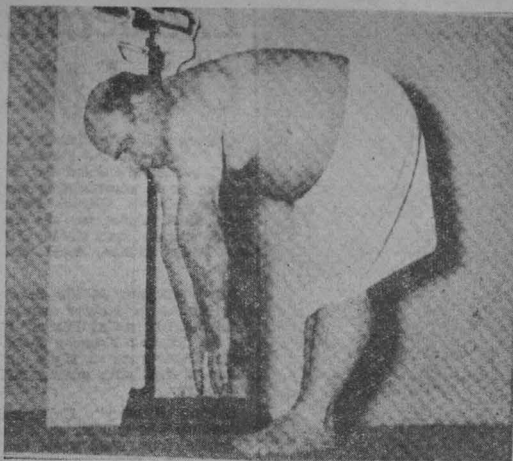

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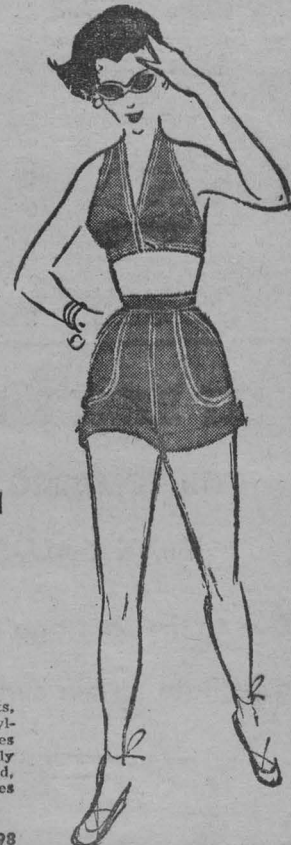

Meeting of campaign managers and representatives will be held at noon Friday, April 3, in the Union committee room, second floor of the Union building.

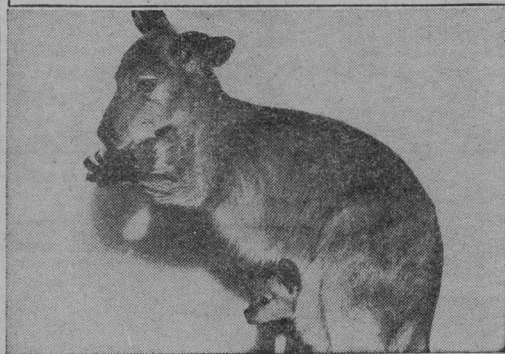
Campaigning will begin Monday at 6 a.m. and the primary election will be held April 8. Final election will be conducted the following week, April 15.

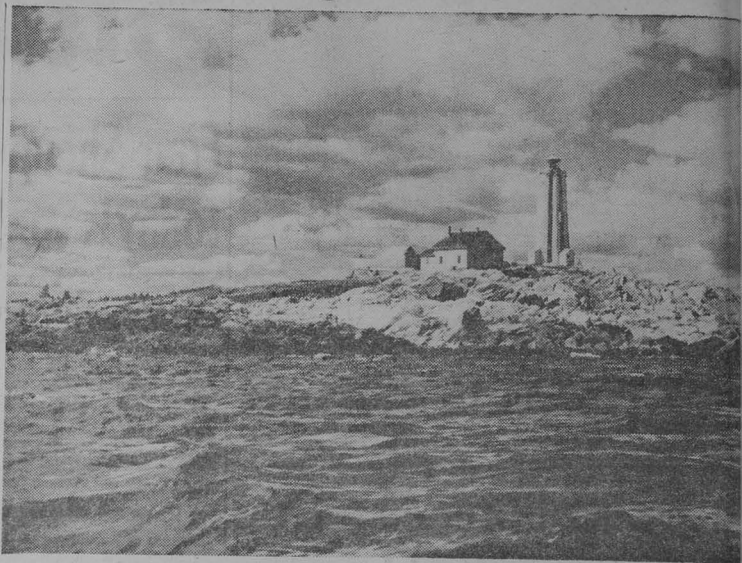

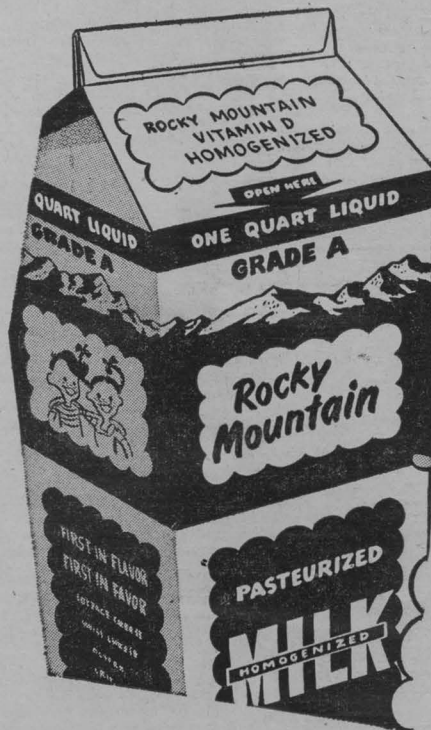

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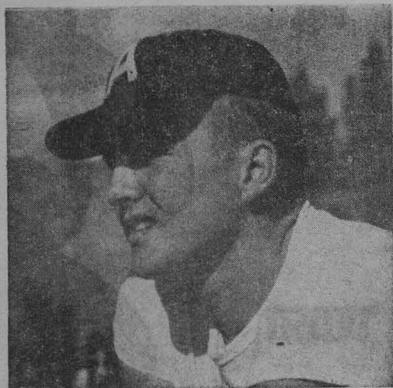
