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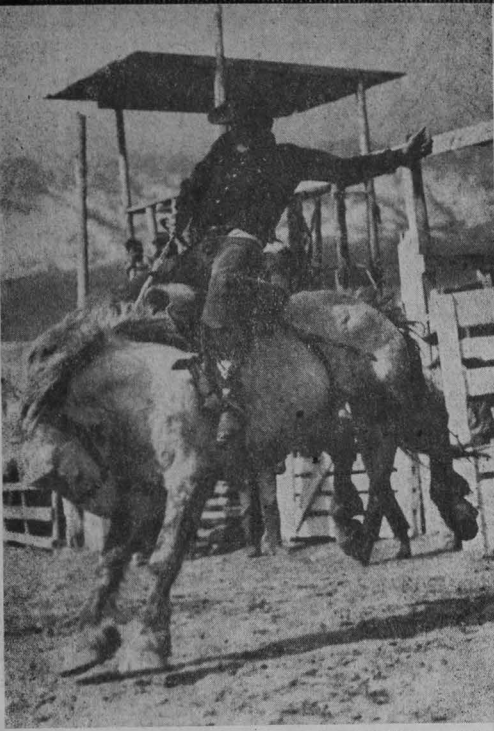

Intercollegiate Rodeo Starts Friday, Sat. At Fairgrounds

Utah State college's third annual intercollegiate rodeo to be held at the Cache county fairgrounds Friday, May 22, begins at 8 p.m., according to George Chournos, general chairman of Western Week.

Teams composed of six men from University of Wyoming, Colorado A & M, Brigham Young University and Utah State will compete in five rodeo events to accumulate points for their school and to win individual prizes.

Events for men include: bare-back bronc riding, bulldogging, saddle bronc riding, calf roping and Brahma bull riding.

Special events for women riders are: clover leaf and barrel riding.

Six Man Teams
"Anybody can enter any of these events for individual prizes," Mr. Chournos said, "however, only the six men from each school can rack up points for their school."

Queen of the rodeo, Miss Margene Mitton, and her two attendants, Ronda Oliverson and Lois Poulson, will reign during the rodeo and 1/2 p.m. award prizes.

Following the rodeo, which will finish at 10 p.m., a dance featuring Wade Ray and his Ozark Mountain Boys will be held in the ballroom of the Aggie student union building. Dress for the

dance will also be western style.

Western Week activities scheduled during noon time on the quad have been called off due to weather conditions, but if possible a broom polo game will be held Thursday or Friday.

Professional stock furnished by LaDel Haslam of Wellsville will be used during the rodeo events.

Entrees pay their own entry. The money from this fee for one event is given to the four top scorers plus a prize donated by local merchants. First prize, trophy belt buckle; second, bride; third, spurs, and fourth, Lee Rider levis.

Charge for the rodeo is 75c with studentbody cards and \$1.25 without. The dance is \$1.25 per couple.

Milk Maids To Vie In Dairy Contest

Each year the dairy industry of the State of Utah sponsors a "June Dairy Month" campaign. Part of this effort is the Dairy Darling contest. Any single girl between the ages of 17 to 25 inclusive is eligible to enter. The winner will be picked on beauty, personality, poise and charm.

"We hope to conclude our report this week," Dr. Bennion stated. "All hearings are ended,

Gary Richardson, studentbody president, will preside over the rally, and Dr. R. O. Porter, alumni council member, will represent the Aggies of the past.

In a pre-rally interview, President Richardson stressed the necessity of enrollment increases next year.

"Each student should do everything in his power to encourage high school seniors with whom he is acquainted, to consider the advantages Utah State offers," Richardson stated.

"Many feel that we have received bad publicity in the past few weeks, here at Utah State. But as LIFE MAGAZINE pointed out, we are doing something about our problems. By careful public relations on the part of every student we can favorably impress our positive approach on the minds of those who can further improve the college by their attendance." So stated the student prexy.

A questionnaire will be distributed during the rally on which every student may express his constructive criticism and suggestions concerning college difficulties.

Boxes in which these questionnaires can be deposited will be placed in the Main, the Bird, the Union Building and the Library.

Quinn Hutchinson, student publicity chairman, was quoted as saying: "Each student has his own opinion and student council can make good use of these varied suggestions. We hope to get every Aggie out to the rally quest for enthusiastic support in this quest for constructive suggestions."

In case of inclement weather, the rally will be held in the field house.

College Chorus Will Present Famous Mass

Under the baton of Professor Walter Welti, the combined men's and women's chorus will present Charles Gounod's "St. Cecilia" mass, Sunday, May 24, 3:30 p. m. in the Logan L.D.S. tabernacle.

This work was chosen to report the religious feelings of this 19th century artist in worshipping God. It is composed of six parts: "Kyrie," "Gloria in Excelsis," "Credo," "Sanctus," "Benedictus," and "Agnus Dei."

Final Performance
The 80 voice chorus, accompanied by Ann McDonald, will present this sacred forte as the final performance of this year.

Three soloists have been chosen to sing with the chorus. They are Pauline Tate, soprano; Eugene Tueller, tenor; Brent Nash, bass. Luana Lee will also sing a part in the "Gloria" in "Excelsis".

Professor Welti said, "This is a composition in which Gounod tries to express many of the feelings and emotions of men toward their God."

There will be no admission charge to the program and all are invited to attend.

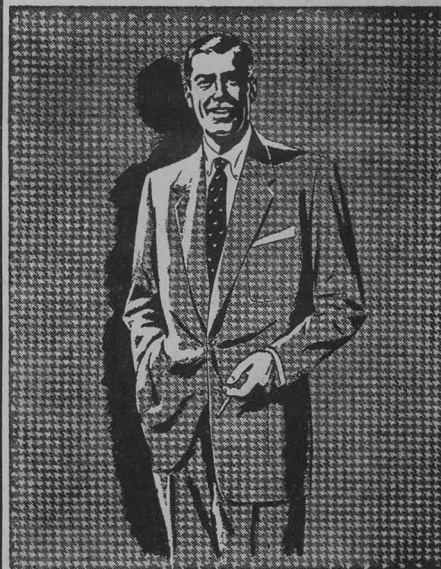
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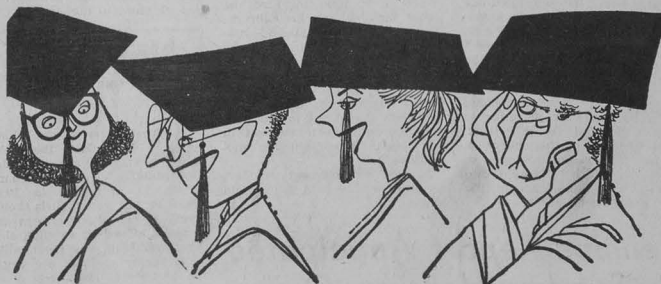
