## Dr. Byrd To Keynote Health Conference

Dr. Oliver E. Byrd, professor of education and chairman of the department of hygiene at Stanford, will be guest lecturer in the second week of the lecture series beginning today.

Dr. Byrd will speak today at 11 a.m. in the LDS Institute. His subject will be "Emotional Aspects of Human Nutrition." Tomorrow's lecture is called "Professional Opinion on the Use of Vitamin Concentrates," and Wednesday Dr. Byrd will speak on "The Role of Trace Elements in Balanced Nutrition."

In addition to appearing on the daily lecture series, Dr. Byrd will be guest speaker for the Health conference, which begins today. First session of the conference, which is themed to better living, will be at 2 p.m. this afternoon in the union ballroom. Dr. E. A. Jacobsen is chairman of today's session, and Dr. Byrd will speak on "Teaching Methods in Health Education; General."

Students may register for first session classes until Wednesday, Dr. John C. Carlisle, dean of summer school, announced today.

Classes began last Tuesday, after registration in the library Monday. Figures on registration have not yet been completed, but advance indications are that more students registered in the graduate school that last year, and lower division registrants number slightly fewer than last year, Dean Carlisle said.

First session classwork will wind-up July 17, with second session beginning July 20. Students who are planning to attend second session but who have not yet registered may do so the first week of the session.

## Soprano, Duo Are Booked For Lyceums

Two lyceum concerts have been booked for the summer season, one by Jean Fenn, new soprano star of the Metropolitan Opera Co., and the other by Nikolai and Joanna Graudan, piano and cello duo.

The Graudans will appear June 23 at 8:15 p.m. in the LDS Institute, and Miss Fenn will appear Thursday, June 25, at 8:15 p.m. Both concerts are for all summer students, with admission being studentbody cards.

Miss Fenn, who recently signed a Metropolitan contract, is a star of the Los Angeles Civic Light Opera Co. She has made nine concert appearances throughout the country this year, and was heard in such works as "La Boheme" and "Pagliacci."

The Graudan duo comprise a unique concert ensemble. Having first established reputations as soloists, Joanna as a pianist and Nikolai as a cellist, the artists combined their talents to become one of the world's foremost duos.

Both are natives of Russia, and in 1938 they came to America. They have made several trips abroad to present concerts. Both artists have also appeared as soloists with symphony orchestras.

Mrs. Thelma G. Flanagan, supervisor of the state school lunch program at Tallahassee, Fla., will be guest lecturer and consultant for the school lunch program conference Tuesday through Thursday, according to Prof. Una Vermillion, chairman.

Mrs. Flanagan will be assisted by leaders from the Utah State Department of Public Instruction in the conference, which will be conducted for supervisors and managers of school lunch programs.

On Thursday Mrs. Flanagan will also be guest lecturer in the daily series at the LDS Institute at 11 a.m.

Mrs. Flanagan has had much experience with the school lunch program in Florida, one of the leading states in advancing the school lunch program. She collaborated on a book called "Growing Through Lunchroom Experiences," a book which has been in wide use throughout the country in connection with the school lunch program.

This past year Mrs. Flanagan has been working closely with the teachers in Florida in order that they might see the purpose of identifying themselves more closely with the school lunch program, according to Professor Vermillion.

## Leora Thatcher, Vosco Call To Star In Play

"Jane", adapted by S. N. Behrman from an original story by W. Somerset Maugham, will be Utah State's summer theater workshop production.

Directed by Prof. Floyd T. Morgan, the play will star Leora Thatcher, guest actress from New York, and Vosco Call, a graduate in dramatics from Utah State.

A middle-age Cinderella story, the play is classed by leading newspapers as a witty, light-hearted comedy. "A civilized comedy written with wit, grace, taste and intelligence," says the New York Times.

Miss Leora Thatcher is a native of Logan, although she has done theater, radio and TV work in the east. She is noted for her role in "Tobacco Road" which after a long run on Broadway, toured the country.

Mr. Call did considerable work in theater productions during his undergraduate days at Utah State. He participated in such plays as "Winterset", "Othello", "Hamlet", "Romeo and Juliet", "George Washington Slept Here", and "Pygmalion." He is now doing graduate work at the University of Washington.

Last summer he starred in the summer theater production, "The Lady's Not for Burning," with guest actress Consuelo Young.

"Members of the theater production class will help with this production and some will be in it," Professor Morgan said. George Tanner will be technical and lighting director.

Any students or towns people who are interested in tryouts for this play should contact Professor Morgan.

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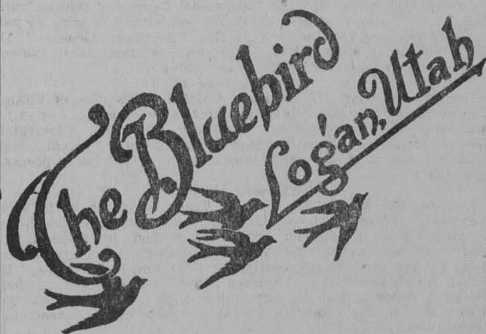
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
