Four new classes which begin today have been added to summer school courses, according to Dr. John C. Carlisle, dean of summer school.

"The Art of Listening" and Public Speaking for Administrators" will be taught during the last three weeks of the first session by Dr. Ralph G. Nichols, professor of speech at University of Minnesota. Two special classes for school administrators will be taught by Dr. W. Blundell, assistant superintendent of schools at Evanston, Ill.

Classwork for all four courses will end July 17.

Dr. Nichols has become recognized as an authority in the field of communications, Dr. Carlisle said. He is in great demand as a speaker. He will also lecture in the daily 11 a.m. series beginning July 6.

Dr. H. Hardin Branch, noted psychiatrist, is guest consultant. He will lecture to all summer school students and faculty daily at 11 a.m. in the LDS Institute and will assist with other meeting of the Institute.

Dr. H. H. Branch Is This Week's Guest Lecturer

Consultant to the Family Life Institute and one of the outstanding lecturers of the summer school lecture series is Dr. H. Hardin Branch, this week's guest lecturer.

Dr. Branch is head of the department of psychiatry in the University of Utah Medical college.

This week's lectures will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at 11 a.m. in the LDS Institute of Religion.

Today Dr. Branch will discuss "Mental Health Needs of the Individual." Subject of tomorrow's lecture is "Role of the Social Institutions in Mental Health," while Wednesday's lecture is entitled "Coordination and Utilization of Mental Health Services."

Dr. Branch is widely known for his keen sight into problems of psychiatry and his ability as a speaker to convey his message to all types of audiences.

A graduate of University of Florida, Dr. Branch received his M.D. from Tulane university in Louisiana in 1935.

Following service with the United States Navy medical corps during World War II, Dr. Branch was a fellow in psychiatry at the Institute of the Pennsylvania hospital, Philadelphia. He also instructed in psychiatry at University of Pennsylvania.

Since 1949 Dr. Branch has been professor and head of the psychiatry department at Utah university. He is also chief consultant for several western hospitals in the field of psychiatry.

Guest lecturer is Dr. L. H. Taboroff, department of psychiatry, University of Utah Medical school.

First meeting of the Institute today at 1:30 p.m. in the union building cafeteria area will deal with "Mental Health Needs of the Child, the Youth and the Adult." Prof Don Carter is chairman. There will be work groups, followed by response by Dr. Branch.

At 8 p.m. tonight in the LDS Institute, Dr. L. H. Taboroff will lecture on "Services for the Exceptional Child." Chairman is Dr. Arden Frandsen.

Tomorrow's sessions open at 1:30 p.m. in the union cafeteria with work groups on the topic of Dr. Branch's morning lecture. Dr. Branch will give a response. Chairman is Dr. C. Jay Skidmore.

At 8 p.m. Tuesday in the Institute, a panel will discuss "Role of the community in Mental Health." Dr. Ralph C. Nichols will be moderator, with the following persons as members of the panel: Dr. Branch, Dr. Donald L. Taylor, Mrs. May P. Simpson, Mrs. H. Cecil Baker, Dr. Eugene Campbell, Sherman Hansen, Franklin Gunnell and Prof. Ruth Malin.

A luncheon of the Utah Association for Mental Health Wednesday at 12:15 p.m. in the Commons cafeteria will feature a talk by Dr. Branch entitled "Conclusions of the 1953 Family Life Institute."

Dr. Bruce Gardner, of the child development department at USAC, is chairman of the conference.

"Miss Julie" by Strindberg is being directed by Vosco Call, USAC dramatics graduate. Members of the cast include Mr. Call, Ruth Burleigh Call and Shirley Oveson. Mr. Call took part in the play at the University of Washington, where he has been doing graduate work during the past year.

Other productions of the theater workshop will be announced in the near future, Professor Morgan said.
