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

About May Swenson

- Born in Logan, Utah (1913-1989)
- Lesbian Poet and Playwright
- Belonged to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints
 - Baptized when she was 8 years old
- Left the LDS Church later in her life
 - "It's not for me—religion. It seems like a redundancy for a poet"




Death Invited
