THAT THE STUDENTS MAY KNOW.

An article which appeared in Student Life, November 13th, caused some disagreement between the "musicians" and the Student Body officers. That our attitude may not be misunderstood by the Student Body, we wish to submit the facts.

Since the writer of the article lacked the courage to sign his name, its publication placed the responsibility upon the editor. That an error was made in allowing it to appear in Student Life is shown by the editorial in the last issue, wherein it was stated that unsigned articles are not allowed to be published.

With a desire of giving those responsible for the error an opportunity of making a satisfactory correction, a meeting was held with the Executive committee, and they were asked to state in Student Life that the article did not express their sentiments. We had two reasons for asking this. First, the article appeared unsigned in the official organ of the Student Body. Second, through courtesy to those whom they employed for their dance. This especially since several of the players are in no way connected with the College. They declined to make any explanation.

We do not care to answer the exaggerated inconsistency of the one who proved himself ignorant of anything musical. However, a few things should be explained. The heading, "A Monopoly on Music" is a falsehood. In what way is there a monopoly? Furthermore, the

price paid for the services of musicians was established by the President of this institution when the Gymnasium was opened, and is the price we are paid for all like engagements. As to the music played "This is The Life", and "Pass the Pickles" would not be very effective funeral dirges. Practically all the music played was of the latest edition.

The musicians of the College and Town feel that they have been unjustly attacked, and since the officials will not resent the affront, it is evident that our services are no longer desirable. Consequently we have notified the Executive Committee that they may procure other musicians for College playing.

student body holding meetings to persuade the students to back up the team. The only meeting held before the Big Game with the Stanford University, was just to give a farewell to the team. But, long before the farewell was given, the students had bought their tickets at \$2.50 a piece. No student was allowed to buy more than one. I saw advertisements on the campus, by the outsiders, ready to buy students' tickets for \$4.00 or \$5.00 a piece; but they could not be secured. There was not a student who did not attend the game. The bleachers were full. I was told that \$50,000 were collected. There were many, outside of the compound, who were ready to pay two or three prices for tickets; but none could be got, as everybody was anxious to attend the game.

It was not after all, a splendid team. The students knew that. Only a few days before the Big Game, the New Zealanders had demonstrated on the California University football field, that the California team was quite inferior, when compared to them. Yet every student had backed up the team, and because they did their best they were patriotic to them.

I find a different state of affairs in our college. The students have to be persuaded. They must even be threatened by the vile epithet of "pikers." That means they are not patriotic to their team. That is an un-American spirit. The players represent our best. We have chosen them because they are superior to all others in fighting our games. The honor or dishonor they get, is shared by us. If the students are so lifeless as not to give their full support, and if they are so immune to feelings of honor or

dishonor, it is high time for the team, to get busy in the snug, comfortable library, or to flirt with pretty girls, rather than break their necks in the chilly, open playground.

Every student can contribute something to the betterment of the institution in which he is studying. One who receives much, and gives nothing, must be a poor, hopeless, student. One should try his best to leave the institution a little better than when he entered it. To create a fine, manly, football spirit is within the easy reach of us all. Nothing can give us greater satisfaction in after years, when we see our Alma Mater leading in the manly fight in the country.

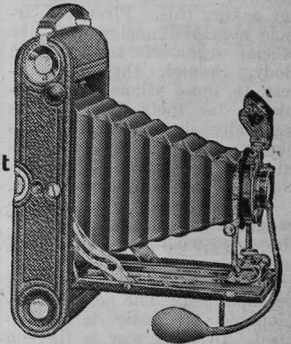
