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
### **Normative Interventions**

Video Modeling- Videos modeling correct verbal responses to conversation topics Self-Management- Tracking



# Parents of Children with **Autism's Perspective**

Parents want the best for their child, for them to be confident, capable, functional members of society. They see a lot of the behaviors as disruptive, which is why they focus on normative interventions that address only the behaviors

One such server provided a safe community for individuals with autism of all ages to interact with each other, eventually encouraging non-verbal individuals to speak
